

# MARINES PUSH INTO NAHA AS CHINESE GAIN

(Continued From Page One)

streets of Fochow after Chiang Kai-shek's infantrymen drove into the port city for the second time, since the Japanese first occupied it. Japanese have listed Fochow, near the northern tip of Formosa, as a potential Yank invasion point.

Chinese regulars and militia-men recaptured Sinciang, 250 miles north of Fochow, and drove the retreating invaders northward toward Hanchow. A Chungking army spokesman reported Japanese were withdrawing to northern China where they will make their final stand on the continent.

**General Gains**

General advances reported from all theaters included Australian capture of Wewak, by-passing Japanese strongpoint on New Guinea; seizure of the elaborate Del Monte airdrome by the U. S. 40th division on Mindanao island, in the southern Philippines; and reconquest of the oil fields off the Borneo coast.

B-29 pilots returning from the first daylight raid on Nagoya, reported "sweeping devastation" in the industrial city. Japanese headquarters, taking official cognizance of Superfortress raids for the first time in nearly a month, admitted scattered sections but claimed most of them were brought under control by noon, about four hours after the first bombs were dropped.

The Superfortresses came in such a continuous parade that the first waves were well on their way back toward their Marianas bases before the last elements took off. Disabling the enemy's broken air forces, they rendezvoused off the coast of Japan before they went in to strike through weak opposition.

Crewmen indicated B-29 losses were light. The miked generals said eight were shot down.

## Klamath Gunman To Enter Plea Soon

Kenneth Bailey, 26-year-old Klamath gunman, must enter a plea May 19 to a charge of first degree murder in connection with the shooting of Oregon State Police Sgt. Ted Chambers of Ontario, Circuit Judge M. A. Biggs of Vale, Ore., ruled Saturday.

Chambers was killed April 29 in a gun battle at Weiser, Idaho, in which Bailey's companion, William Ronald Duffey, 22, also of Klamath Falls was slain. Three officers were injured.

A former Klamath Falls resident, Wea-ver Solomon, was among those liberated from Santo Tomas prison in the Philippines and brought by ship to Los Angeles on May 2. Solomon was accompanied by his wife, whom he married in Manila, and their 7-year-old daughter, Elaine.

the nearly four years they've been at war they've killed and captured 12,600,000 Germans.

Today's dispatches tell us that German prisoners taken by the Russians are "being rapidly corralled into camps to join thousands of their comrades who are being shipped across Poland to be PUT TO WORK restoring Russia's war-damaged cities."

The Russians have no illusions. They believe in dealing with realities.

**EISENHOWER**, repudiates handshakes and other "friendly enemy" demonstrations by any of his officers and says "drastic measures have been set in motion to assure termination of these ERRORS forthwith."

He uses rather large words, but leaves no doubt of his belief that some hands are too bloody to be shaken.

**THERE** isn't much news from Europe, and one has the feeling that censoring there is about as tight as ever. Senator Morse of Oregon calls on the administration to lift the censorship ban at once, now that the Germans have been whipped and military security is no longer involved.

**ON** the home front, we're tightening our belts in order to make our food supply go farther in relieving hunger in Europe.

Congress feels pretty definitely that we'd have MORE food if we had LESS conflicting regulation. Chairman Thomas of the senate food investigating committee says today: "OPA is responsible only for holding down prices, NOT for production. WFA (war food administration) has responsibility for production but NONE for prices."

He says we'd be better off if we had fewer of these alphabet agencies to quarrel with each other. Most of us are inclined to agree with him.

**THE** Seventh war loan starts officially today.

**U. S.** war bonds are the BEST BUYS ON EARTH. You can get your money out of them when you need it. Meanwhile there isn't much in the way of goods to buy. The smart thing is to save your money now and use it when it will do you some real good.

The German forces which had resisted the Russians in violation of unconditional surrender terms were commanded by Field Marshal Gen. Ferdinand Schoerner and Lt. Gen. Otto Woehler, but neither officer was reported to be among nazis seized. The Russians have named Schoerner a war criminal.

Among those surrendering, however, was a Maj. Gen. Backer, commander of the third SS "Death's Head" tank division, who gave himself up to Marshal Rodion Y. Malinovsky's second Ukrainian army.

## Nazi Sub Gives Up To Yanks

**AT SEA OFF CAPE MAY**, N. J. May 14 (AP)—The U-858, first German submarine taken by American forces in the Atlantic since the capitulation of Germany, surrendered today.

The 240-foot submarine had been at sea eight weeks and had sunk 16 allied vessels, its commander, Captain Lieutenant Thilo Bode, informed navy questioners.

Commander J. P. Norfleet of Bertie county, North Carolina, accepted the surrender on behalf of Rear Admiral Milo F. Dracmel, commandant of the fourth naval district.

## Basis For Influence

3. Prepare a firm basis for Russia's maximum influence in the power politics of the future. Russia's proposal that the Big-Five sit in as permanent members of a trusteeship council is seen as a move in this direction; so is the soviet recommendation that the proposed world security council, under Big-Five control, have the final word on setting up military bases in international territories.

Russia's moves here are being studied intently by British and United States authorities because she is relatively new to the international scene. Only now are her postwar policies as a great military, political and geographical power—and potentially a large industrial power—beginning to take shape.
