Ferriss went on to beat the Tigers, with the famous Paul (Duke) Trout on the mound, 5-2, giving up nine hits and striking out 14 for his third victory against no defeats.

Although the Yankees lost their grip on first place, Veteran Alton Donald did not lose his mastery of the Indians.

## Sports Await Developments After Travel Cut Forecast

WASHINGTON, May 14 (AP)—Athletic leaders adopted a wait-and-see attitude today in the wake of ODT's disclosure that sports may be hit hard by further travel curtailment.

Deploring the tremendous redeployment war problem, J. Monroe Johnson, office of defense transportation director, said Saturday that sports will "be lucky" to play out regular schedules this summer and fall unless Japan quits quickly.

"No one would be happier than I if we could cut all wartime travel restrictions," he explained, "but the brutal, inescapable fact is that due to transportation demands ahead, we must be prepared for further curtailment."
