750,000 Britons Due For Release

LONDON, May 16 (AP)—Britain hopes to be able to release 750,000 from the armed forces before the end of the year, Labor Minister Ernest Bevin announced today in presenting a broad "man-power re-allocation" program to commons.

Releases will start June 18, Bevin said. He cautioned against calling the broad program a "demobilization" scheme, declaring it was merely a beginning of a re-allocation of manpower in this country, which has been one of the most heavily mobilized in the world. Bevin announced relaxations
