

# Dodger Win Streak Ends, Giants Roll

Pittsburgh Kayos Brooklyn Boys 12-3, Cardinals Drop Boston With Relief Man

The honeymoon was over in Flatbush today with the Dodgers' 11-game winning streak ended but the New York Giants still were rolling in high gear with 12 victories in their last 13 games.

Pittsburgh did a thorough, 12-3 job on Leo Durocher's gang, which had knocked them off three in a row. It was the first loss for Brooklyn to the western clubs that sunk them 84 times in 88 starts last season.

Perhaps Frankie Frisch had the right answer to his Pirate problems when he benched five regulars Wednesday. The Portlun flash put Bob Elliott, Babe Dahlgren, Tommy O'Brien, Frankie Gustine and Al Lopez back in the lineup and coasted home on a 15-hit cushion, nine blows coming from the "dog house" five.

Tom Seals, who shut out the Cardinals last time out, was baited off the hill in the third. Seven previous Brooklyn starters had gone the route. Wily Nick Strincevich aided the Bums into submission with six hits, stopping the batting streaks of both Luis Olmo and Goody Rosen.

Charley Grimm spent another dreary afternoon in the Chicago Cubs' third base coaching box against the Giants, getting more exercise waving relief pitchers in from the bullpen than from waving base runners home. Claude Passau had the Giants down, 5-2, going to the last of the eighth but he walked Mel Ott and was nicked for singles by Joe Medwick, Phil Weintraub and Ernie Lombardi in succession for the start of a six-run spurt. Eleven men went to bat as New York rallied to win, 8-5.

Pittsburgh was due to come into the Polo grounds today and then the Giants will have seen all the western clubs. So far they haven't been unduly impressed.

The St. Louis Cardinals got a splendid job of relief chucked by Rookie Ken Burkhardt who tossed a full nine-inning six-hitter against Boston, 7-4, after Starter Stan Partenheimer had been yanked with two on and nobody out in the first. Round Trippers Ray Sanders and Babe Adams helped Burkhardt recover from his first pitch, a three-run homerun ball to Butch Nieman.

Frank McCormick's circuit clout with one on in the eighth enabled Cincinnati's Walter (Boom Boom) Beck to trim Whit Wyatt and the Phillies, 4-2, on a five-hitter.

If the western weather continues stormy, the American league teams will have to play in the rain just to keep their franchises. Not since Sunday has there been a contest played in the junior circuit, with rain and cold weather closing the parks no matter whether the teams tried to play in the afternoon, twilight or night.

The series of postponements has been particularly hard on the treasury of the Chicago White Sox. Jimmy Dykes' Pale Hose in first place had counted on a four-day series with the New York Yankees to whittle the turnstiles. All were postponed. Next time the Yanks come back June 30, the Sox may be back to normal.

# Baseball Men Perplexed By Military Redeployment

NEW YORK, May 18 (AP)—Military redeployment with the end of the war in Europe finds baseball men perplexed today — not knowing whether to make preparations for the return of some of its stars-in-service or adopt a wait-and-see policy.

Buoayed up by the announcement that approximately 1,300,000 men would be discharged during the next 12 months, baseball officials reasonably believed that some players would be among them.

However, it was learned that only a few players have sufficient points to be eligible for discharge and even those might be kept in service for the war against Japan.

Hank Greenberg, whom the Detroit Tigers had expected back in their outfield before the close of the season, already has been assigned to the recreational program in Europe.

Carl Davis, Tigard Union high pitcher and outfielder, was appointed today to the Out-city nine which will battle an All-star Portland squad here May 30.

Bobby Feller of the Cleveland Indians, recently named manager of the Great Lakes nine, and the Yankee's Joe DiMaggio, a physical instructor in Atlantic City, N. J., are not expected to be released until the war with Japan is over.

Of approximately 525 big leaguers in service, only about 25 have been in more than three years. They include Tommy Bridges, Barney McCoskey, Pat Mullin, Tebbetts and Greenberg of the Tigers; Buddy Lewis and Cecil Travis of the Senators; Hal Schumacher of the Giants; Harry Lavagetto of the Dodgers; Hugh Mulcahy of the Phillies; Sam Chapman of the Athletics and Feller of the Indians.

# Stay Home, Fisherman, Stay Home!

PORTLAND, May 18 (AP)—The state game commission warned anglers today they might just as well stay home this weekend.

Fishing outlook in most of Oregon is poor, game scouts reported, with high and muddy water in nearly every county.

A few exceptions: Wood river and Seven Mile creek in Klamath county have yielded large rainbows with bait in the last few days. Odell and Crescent lakes offer fair trolling; and Four Mile and Cherry creeks are good for bait fishing.

Neahlem river in Columbia county has yielded good cut-throat trout catches; and anglers have taken the limit from Big Luckiamute river in Polk county.

Jo Jo White, the ex-Detroit Tiger, swatted six for six—including two doubles—as he led the Senators to their first victory of the week over the Aorns. Guy Fletcher held Oakland to five scattered hits while the Solons were garnering 18 off Veteran Jack Lotz and Jimmy Munzo.

The Padres clubbed four Hollywood moundsmen for 21 safeties. The Stars committed eight errors to aid in their defeat. Bob Ferguson allowed the Stars but eight scattered hits.
