## SHOW SECURITY CARDS, URGES BOARD LEADER

With many returning servicemen entering the labor market for the first time, and with students getting jobs in the coming holidays, Howard J. Nelson, manager of the Klamath Falls office of the social security board, advised all workers "to show their social security account card to every employer for whom they work."

This is essential to protect the worker's wage record, which is maintained under his name and number for his future monthly insurance benefits, Nelson pointed out. For example, there are approximately 375,000 Smiths on the social security board's records and, therefore, there are approximately 375,000 accounts under the name of Smith. It is important that no two Smiths have the same number.

In stressing this point of one number for a worker's lifetime, Nelson said that employers are required to report each worker's wages, under both his name and number to the government every three months. Then these wages are credited by the social security board on each worker's individual ledger sheet, under both his name and number.
