BAD BRAKES FOUND ON 12 OF 25 CARS

Twelve of 25 cars checked here during the week from May 8 to 14 were found to have bad brakes, according to Chief of Police Orville Hamilton, under whose direction the nationwide "brake-check" program is being carried out locally. Under the "brake-check" program a block of wood one inch high is placed under the brake pedal of the car being checked. If the brake pedal hits the block of wood when the stopping mechanism is applied, the brakes need adjusting. Locally, cars are not being stopped on the highway for the check, but the police are checking the brakes on all cars involved in accidents or those stopped for any other reason. The brake program is a nationwide event under the supervision of the chiefs of police, to make the motorists conscious of faulty brakes. Locally, the publicity angle is handled by the junior chamber of commerce under Bill Kunz, publicity chairman.
