## REIBEN TELLS OF BOMBING WOUNDS

TULELAKE—A V-mail letter was received Monday from Capt. Donald Reiben of the 44th infantry division under Gen. Patch in Germany, the first word since he was reported seriously wounded in Austria. The letter, which was received by his wife, the former Mary Frances Johnson of Tulelake, stated that he was wounded on April 30 when a German building, in which he was located, was bombed. He suffered a skull fracture and injuries to both legs. He was unconscious for four days, and was finally evacuated to a hospital in France, from where the letter was written.

Capt. Reiben was awarded the Silver Star on December 12 at Waterloo, France, for gallantry in action, at which time he made five trips by foot past an exploding tank to render aid to five men who were critically wounded. He is also the holder of the Bronze Star and a government citation which were given to him for action at Avre field in France on November 16. When several of the stretcher carriers had been killed, he undertook the role of litter bearer, and safely brought back nine casualties while under fire from the enemy.

Prior to entering the service in September of 1944, Reiben was a student at the University of California in Berkeley, where he was studying dentistry. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Reiben of Tulelake.

His brother-in-law, 1st Lt. French E. Johnson of the United States army air corps, and pilot of a P-47 fighter plane was in the first tactical air group that met Donald's division, although the two have not seen each other as yet. Young Johnson has completed 90 missions overseas. He is a graduate of the Tulelake high school, and was a student at Oregon State college at the time of his enlistment. Son of Mr. and Mrs. French Johnson at Tulelake, he has been in the service for two years.

## MEMORIAL STAMPS TO FEATURE FOR WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, May 23 (AP)—Four memorial stamps bearing Franklin D. Roosevelt's portrait will be issued beginning June 27 in tribute to the late president, Postmaster General Walker announced today.

Each bearing Mr. Roosevelt's likeness, the stamps will be in these denominations and colors: one cent, green; two cent, red; three cent, purple, and five cent, blue. They will be of the special delivery stamp size.

Mr. Roosevelt's portrait will appear at the left on each stamp with the dates "1882-1945" and the name "Roosevelt" underneath the portrait. At the right on the one cent stamp will appear a picture of Mr. Roosevelt's home at Hyde Park while the "little white house" at Warm Springs, Ga., will be pictured on the two cent stamp and the White House on the three cent stamp.

The design for the five cent stamp will be announced later, Mr. Walker said.

## First Sourdough President Dies

CARVER, May 23 (AP)—Funeral services will be held Thursday for Charles Leon Peabody, 70, first president of the Alaska Sourdoughs' association, who died in the Clackamas river home to which he had retired.

Peabody, who succumbed Saturday, made his stake in the Alaska gold rush. He was an extensive world traveler and founder of the Peabody fund for needy Masonic lodges. He was the son of Thomas Jefferson Peabody, Oregon pioneer.

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## SALARY BOOST PROBABLE FOR COUNTY LABOR

Members of the county court and county budget committee were slated to sign the 1945-46 budget Wednesday and it looks like an increase in salary for a number of courthouse employees.

Deputies' salaries were on the increase and will go into effect July 1, if the budget is signed as scheduled.

Members of the county clerk's office received an increase when Charles F. DeLap took over the clerk's duties January 1, 1945. This was explained by DeLap who said Tuesday that he had reduced the number of employees listed in the 1944-45 budget from nine to six, and also reduced the salary budget from \$20,766, to \$17,940, or a saving of \$2826 per year.

Figures presented to the court and budget committee for the year's budget ending July 1, 1945, and under the administration of former County Clerk Mae K. Short, were as follows: county clerk's salary (set by law), \$2700; salary chief deputy, \$2700; one deputy, \$1920; three deputies, \$5580; circuit court deputy, \$2400; one deputy, \$1740; one deputy, \$1800; extra help, \$500; supplies, \$3000; travel expense, \$250; elections, \$8750; total, \$31,280.

Proposed overall budget for this office, showing a decrease of \$3420, July 1, 1945, to July 1, 1946, is as follows: County clerk's salary, \$2700; chief deputy, \$3120; one deputy, \$2100; three deputies, \$6300; circuit court deputy, \$2400; one deputy, \$1200; one deputy, assistant county court, \$420; extra help, \$500; supplies, \$2000; travel expense, \$100; elections, \$7000; total, \$27,840. The \$1200 salary listed above is a half-time photostatic machine operator, DeLap said.

It is understood that other deputy salaries will be increased accordingly by the budget committee.

## REGULATION OF AIR COMMERCE ARGUED

SACRAMENTO, May 23 (AP)—Proposed state regulation of air commerce and the question of whittling \$40,000,000 from sales tax revenue by lowering the levy from 2 1/2 to 2 per cent were controversial issues in the assembly today.

Senate revenue and taxation committee action killed the proposal to increase the gasoline tax a cent and a half a gallon to aid in financing a postwar super highway system. Following a hearing last night the committee voted 9 to 2 to table the bill.

Of personal importance to legislators today was the fact that this was the last day on which they draw their pay of \$12 per day, although \$10 per day expenses will continue until adjournment. The constitution limits pay to the first 100 days of the session.

The measure to regulate the intra-state airplane industry would give the state railroad commission power to supervise and regulate transportation of persons and property within the state, to order curtailment or extension of services and to prosecute actions on its own initiative before federal rate making agencies. It is opposed by several airlines engaged in both intra-state and interstate operations.
