

THREE-POINT RECREATION PROGRAM SET

Now that school is out, and the long-awaited summer vacation is here, many of the students, as well as parents are beginning to wonder "What now—where do we go from here?"

In answer to this very real question and proving that our city fathers have the interests of the citizens at stake, E. E. Hambrick, city recreation director, speaking before the recreation commission, announced the summer recreation program for 1945 which will get under way on June 11 with the registration of those interested. Those interested in swimming are asked to register at the natatorium between the hours of 9 and 12, although any wishing to register later will be permitted to do so. The swimming program, which will cover a two-months' period, will be conducted by Joe Peak, boys' physical education director at Klamath Union high school.

Those interested in woodwork, handicraft, arts, basket weaving, stenciling and glass painting will gather at the manual arts shop at the high school. Phyllis Foster is to be the head supervisor, with capable assistance in these classes. This will also be a two-months' program. The play program and physical fitness class will be held at the gymnasium and playground of Mills school, with several supervisors constantly on hand. All programs will continue through August 10, and the average hours will be from 9 to 12 in the morning, and 1 to 4 in the afternoon.

The culmination of the recreation program will consist of two weeks of camping at Lake o' the Woods. One week will be devoted to the boys, and the second for the girls who are interested. It is earnestly desired that all boys and girls who would like this camping program register at the office of the city judge, Harold Franey, as soon as possible. All campers will receive a copy of necessary equipment and items needed for the week. The cost for each camper for the seven days will be \$10, which includes transportation to and from Lake o' the Woods, board and room and supervision, and a fee of 50 cents must also accompany each application. There will be a trained nurse among the several counselors on hand at the camp at all times.

Any additional information relative to the recreational program may be obtained at the office of the director, E. E. Hambrick, by calling in person, or phoning 7112 and, it is suggested, that calls be made in the morning after 9 o'clock.

Breakfast Ride Set To Marine Barracks

WAR CASUALTY LIST NEARS MILLION MARK

WASHINGTON, May 24 (P) — The army and navy have suffered almost a million casualties since the beginning of the war, the two services reported today. The army has lost 886,525, on a basis of individual names received here through May 14. Navy losses of 109,564 make the total 996,089. This is an increase of 9875 above last week's report. The breakdown on army casualties and corresponding figures for the preceding week: Killed 181,739 and 178,854; wounded 550,506 and 544,249; missing 57,802 and 66,684; prisoners 96,478 and 89,152. Under Secretary of War Patterson said that 302,910 of the wounded have returned to duty and 25,856 of the prisoners have been officially listed as exchanged or returned to military control. Similar figures for the navy: Killed 42,807 and 41,986; wounded 52,005 and 50,421; missing 10,505 and 10,620; prisoners 4247 and 4248.

Deferment Policy Data Not Received

No official word on the policy of indefinite deferments for men over 29 in "useful work" has been received by the local selective service board, it was reported today by Ted Case, clerk in charge of Klamath county boards.

A number of men over 30 years of age reported for their pre-induction physicals Wednesday leaving for Portland by train that afternoon. The next group to report for army induction is scheduled for June, the exact date to be announced when a call is received from state headquarters, Case said.

Workers Don't Want To Be Fenced In

GRAND COULEE, May 24 (P) — Plenty of room seems to be the paramount desire of bureau of reclamation workers here who have been surveyed as to their desires in a possible town development for government workers here after the war. The average resident will be satisfied with a one-story house but he wants 6000 square feet of lawn and 2000 square feet of garden, Frank A. Banks, regional reclamation director, said the survey indicated.

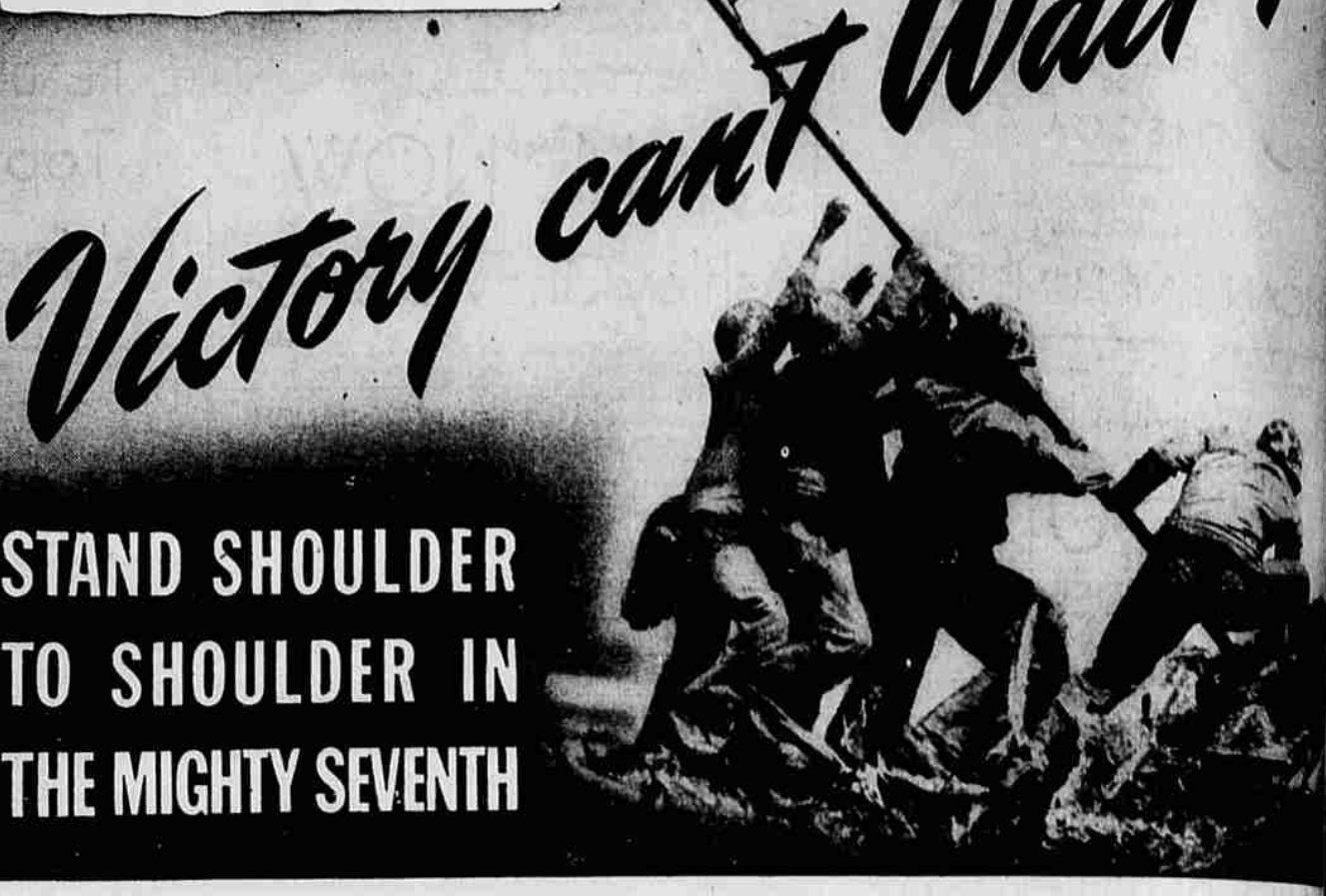
