## QUEEN CONTEST RULES LISTED BY COMMITTEE

Rules for the queen's contest for the Klamath Buckaroo Days celebration July 1, 2, 3 and 4, have been announced by O. D. Matthews, president of the committee in charge to enter a candidate in this show.

1. Candidates must be between the ages of 16 and 24, and single.  
2. Legal resident of the community sponsoring her.  
3. A good horsewoman, and furnish her own mount.  
A riding contest will be held at the fairgrounds June 17. Contestants will be given up to 65 points on riding ability. On June 23 there will be a queen's ball at the armory. Contestants will receive up to 10 points on personality, 10 on charm, 10 on poise and five on dress.

Girls desiring to enter the contest for queen of Buckaroo Days must register by letter or in person with a member of the committee.  
Those accepted will be properly chaperoned throughout all activities of the show. The girl selected as queen will preside the four days of the celebration. Her court will consist of the other entrants of the contest. Judgment will be on ability to handle horses, personality and beauty, with particular emphasis on portrayal of the ideal western woman.

came to his office in the Odd Fellows building Saturday, May 5, at 4 p. m., at which time he said he would be back the next day or the following Monday to assist with some work they were contemplating. He has not been seen nor heard from since that time.  
Accompanied by Sheriff Lloyd L. Low, Chase visited the Wendling street cabin his brother purchased a short time ago, and examination of contents and foodstuffs indicated that Chase had not been in the cabin for some time. The missing man's brother, Chase said, had a small amount of money on his person when last seen.  
Chase had been in good health, the attorney said. The men have one sister, Mrs. Bessie Woods of Martinez, Calif. She has been
