Although this sport has always been a favorite with residents in the Klamath basin, there has been a definite increase in popularity within the past year, due to the presence of army, navy and marine personnel in this area. Two riding groups that have earned a great deal of recognition and credit during the past few years are the Klamath Saddle club, with President Blanche Harmon as leader, and the Sheriff's Posse, under the direction of Capt. E. P. (Pat) Ivory. In addition to being a couple of snappy looking outfits, both assemblies have worked long and steadily in the interest of attaining perfection in drilling form.

The Klamath Saddle club is a closed organization of 25 members, who are easily distinguished by their colorful light blue and white riding habits. Besides appearing in local exhibitions, these women are sponsoring horse shows and races, group rides, club dinners, and the ever popular barn dances. The Saddle club has also been granted permission to organize a clubhouse at the county fairgrounds, and along with its other activities, is doing more than its part in the war effort.

A full-time schedule is being completed by the Sheriff's Posse, that now boasts approximately five servicemen, primarily marines, in its membership. This troupe attends all of the local rodeos, never failing to win acclaim for riding ability, and each month the members are hosts at some type of social function. Not only riding for pleasure, these men, headed by the sheriff of Klamath county, have a definite task to perform, and are often called out in case of emergencies.

Stable Problem
Not only servicemen, but managers of riding academies and stables as well are being faced with an acute housing problem, for since the gas shortage has become a major issue, many of the horses that were formerly pastured in the country are now being boarded nearer town for the convenience of their city-dwelling owners. With the debut of a sudden interest in riding, stables are filled to overflowing with steeds that have been recently purchased by enthusiastic youngsters and oldsters.

The bit and spur are not idle this season, the curry comb and brush are being put to good use with the advent of warm spring weather, and the "wide open spaces" are beckoning in a come-hither manner to anyone who can sit a saddle.

Ample Funds In State For Building Program

PORTLAND, May 24 (AP)—Oregon has ample funds for the \$10,000,000 postwar state building program to be voted on in the June 22 special election, Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell Jr. declared here.

He revealed in a talk before Multnomah chapter of the Oregon Republican club that the state tax commission will have a \$15,625,221.51 surplus on June 30.

Farrell said the surplus will completely offset the 5-mill, two-year property tax set up in the measure providing \$6,000,000 for state institution buildings and \$4,000,000 for higher education buildings.
