MINERS CRITICIZE ECCLES' STATEMENT

BOISE, Ida., May 26 (AP)—Western gold mining men criticized today a statement they attributed to Mariner S. Eccles of Ogden, Utah, head of the federal reserve system, terming it "unfortunate."

Robert S. Palmer of Denver, managing director of the Western Economic and Mining Affiliates, Inc., said Eccles told a senate committee recently that advocates of hard money have "the archaic idea of maintaining a gold reserve back of the currency."

That statement, the organization said in a resolution, embodies "a foreign ideology not suitable to this country."

The resolution "insisted on continuance" of the congressional monetary policy of 1933 which made gold and silver the nation's standard money.

Mining men from Oregon, Washington, Nevada, New Mexico, Utah, Idaho, Montana and Colorado attended the two-day conference which concludes today.

In other resolutions the group development expenses be included in mining costs which are deductible in calculating federal income taxes, pledged support to efforts of non-ferrous metal miners to gain increased prices and urged that domestic producers be permitted to sell their gold on the world market.

Yugoslavs Refuse Comment On Trieste

PORTLAND, Ore., May 26 (AP)—Pausing briefly here en route to Seattle, two Yugoslavian delegates to the San Francisco conference would make no statement on the Trieste dispute.

Stanoje Simich, ambassador to the United States, said, "that is a question before the conference. We cannot discuss that question now."

A reporter asked Vladimir Dedijer, interpreter and a member of Tito's staff, about possibilities of a Balkan federation.

"No," he declared, "That's Goebbels' stuff." The delegates were on their way for a two day visit with Nick Bez, Seattle, Yugoslavian council worker. "We are very happy to visit there," Dedijer said, lauding Washington state's aid to the Yugoslavian war effort.

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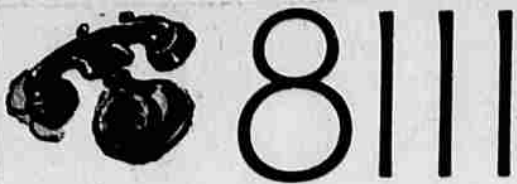

'MISSING' MARINE REPORTED SAFE

ALBANY, May 26 (AP)—The disappearance of an unidentified marine feared drowned in an auto accident was unraveled today when officers reported him safe at Camp Adair naval hospital.

Pvt. Fred Herman Tayloe of Norfolk, Va., told naval authorities he was the marine riding with Army Sgt. Roy McMahon, Albany, whose car dived into Waverly Lake Thursday. He struggled out of the car and hauled the soldier up to the bank, Tayloe said.

Leaving McMahon standing up, apparently not badly hurt, the marine thumbed his way back to the hospital, where he is a patient, Chief of Police Perry Stellmacher reported.

The dazed sergeant later was given a lift into town, unable to give a coherent account of the accident except to say there had been someone else in the car.

Baffled police officers ordered the lake dragged, but only the two men's caps were found.

Midnight Curfew Lifted For Men, Women In Service

PORTLAND, May 26 (AP)—After June 1, men and women in military service will not have to leave night clubs at midnight, Hugh R. Kirkpatrick, state liquor commission chairman, said today.

The announcement came after a western defense command ruling giving armed forces personnel the same "curfew" status as civilians.

PORTLAND, May 26 (AP)—Uptate war bond sales pushed Oregon's 7th War Loan total to \$31,130,166 today, following Friday sales which topped previous daily records.

Yesterday's sales reached \$2,140,126—more than half, \$1,291,206, in E bonds.

ALCOA PLANT CUT TO ONE POTLINE

VANCOUVER, Wash., May 26 (AP)—The Aluminum Company of America's strikebound Vancouver plant was cut to one potline today, and volunteers who stepped in when production workers stopped hoped they could keep it rolling.

The fourth potline closed a little after midnight, office workers abandoned their desks to man the last remaining line. The dispute—called a "sit-down" by management and a "lockout" by the AFL aluminum workers union—arose Thursday when the 450 production workers refused to remain at their posts until a foreman was transferred or dismissed.

The other 450 employees, including members of AFL crafts unions, remained on the job. A few, volunteering to the potlines, have worked four consecutive shifts.

The production workers, refused admittance yesterday when they declined to pledge that they would work the lines, said they would return immediately if the foreman were dismissed.

Three Held On Auto Theft Charges

ROSEBURG, May 26 (AP)—Ernest M. Dunbar, 21, and his wife, Frances Lucille Dunbar, 19, of Puyallup, Wash., together with Ray John Puett, 18, Parkland, Wash., are being held at Roseburg for Washington state authorities on charges of auto theft. State Police Sgt. Paul Morgan reported today.

The trio was taken into custody near Glendale, Ore., this morning while driving an automobile reported stolen Friday at Mehama, Wash., Morgan said.

AGENT APPOINTED
DALLAS, May 26 (AP)—Russell T. Daulton, Corvallis, will become assistant Polk county agent, succeeding Ted Tibbutt, resigned.

Daulton, to direct 4-H work in this county, will arrive here next month.

ADAPTATION OF QUESTION PERIOD ASKED

WASHINGTON, May 26 (AP)—Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore.) explained today why he wants a representative of each federal department to sit in the house of representatives with voting privileges.

Declaring that the legislative and executive branches haven't enough contact, Ellsworth said his plan is an adaptation of the British "question period," when the house questions cabinet members.

"Since our cabinet members are already heavily burdened with duties and responsibilities, they could not reasonably be expected to be available to congress at all times," he told a house-senate committee. "Furthermore, such a liaison would be a specialized job. Therefore, let there be created for each department an officer who might be known as a deputy secretary, who will sit as a member of the house of representatives, take part in debate on the floor of the house, be available at all times for questioning, and himself have the right of asking questions in debate."

"In other words, let him be a bona fide member of the house, leaving for his constituency the department in which he serves. I think it would also be proper to give such a member voting privileges on the floor. Let such a member have all the rights and privileges of any other member of the house, except the right of vote in committees. It would be his duty, of course, to attend meetings of all committees dealing with legislation in which his department was in any way concerned, but it would give such an officer too much influence over legislation to allow his vote in committee."

Ellsworth said he assumed these representatives would be appointed by the president. He told a reporter that, while he felt that they should not vote in committee, he believed they should have the right to vote on the floor. It would be proper, he thought, even if their vote decided a tie for, in his opinion, in such rare cases, the department's responsibility under the proposed legislation should carry extra weight.

TRIAL SET
NEW YORK, May 26 (AP)—The trial of Vidkun Quisling was set for August 25 at a preliminary hearing today in Oslo, an NBC broadcast from Norway said.

Request was sent to national headquarters when a group of Pendleton residents refused to use the present center for all races of servicemen, as suggested by the regional USO.

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MORSE ASKS DELAY IN PAY INCREASES

WASHINGTON, May 26 (AP)—Senators should be better paid, Sen. Morse (R-Ore.) believes. But he thinks there's nothing they can do about it until after the war.

The proposed \$2500 congressional expense account would violate the Little Steel formula, Morse says, and he's searching through the records he acquired while a member of the war labor board for documentary evidence to support his belief.

Morse told the senate Thursday that the war labor board has turned down many an application by employers who wanted to allow expense accounts and bonuses of various kinds in lieu of wage increases. "I believe the same wage stabilization principles should apply to members of congress which they, in turn, expect the WLB to apply to the population as a whole," he said.
