have been knocked out by precision-firing American guns. Naval sources declined to place any interpretations on the series of actions, and a spokesman, when asked if they indicated withdrawals, replied: "They may be part of the whole picture, and they may not; it's sort of risky to guess."

The possibility exists that the actions forecast a withdrawal to new positions in the hills south of the present lines. These hills are not as rugged, however, and they are not expected to be as heavily defended.

trial at the earliest possible time." **No Delays** Jackson emphasized there would be no delay in bringing to justice those Germans involved in battlefield atrocities against the American armed forces, such as the Malmedy slayings and the execution of captured airmen. These cases, which are strictly an American problem and do not fall under the jurisdiction of any international tribunal, are being prepared by the judge advocate general's office. Procedure will be equivalent to court martial.

French Clash With Syrians; Trieste Argument Unsolved

French reinforcements were called from Homs, he added. Communications at Hama, on the highway to Aleppo, were cut. There were as yet no indications that the controversy between the Yugoslavs and western allies over Trieste and Belgrade had been settled, and a Belgrade broadcast ostentatiously quoting Marshal Tito criticized the treatment accorded "our nationals." The radio said Tito declared in a speech last night at Ljubljana that "it would be a terrible tragedy if we should have to fight again for what we have already won in this war." "Await Liberation" The people in the Austrian province of Carinthia "are awaiting their liberation," the speech continued, "and on behalf of the new federated Yugoslavia I assure them that our thoughts have not abandoned Carinthia, which today, unfortunately, must still tremble and suffer under a gestapo terror which is clad in another uniform." Field Marshal Robert Ritter von Greim, chief of the German air force, committed suicide by taking poison, it was disclosed. Another Nazi taken into allied custody was Albert Forster, former German governor of Danzig. **Face Starvation** Germans face starvation, with supplies for the civilian population only sufficient "possibly through the month of June," headquarters of the 15th army announced. Hearing Set On Building Charge

PORTLAND, Ore., May 28 (AP)—Final hearing for Edward L. Kropp, Seattle, former war production board priority analyst charged with unauthorized construction of a new home, will be held in U. S. district court here June 9.

At a preliminary hearing Saturday WPB Enforcement Attorney Theodore S. Turner testified Kropp began building an \$8000 home near Beaverton, Ore., without FHA approval. Kropp is accused of ignoring two WPB telegrams and officials said he was halted only by suit filed May 17.

TRUMAN ASKS \$25 LAYOFF BENEFITS

WASHINGTON, May 28 (AP)—President Truman recommended today maximum weekly unemployment compensation payments of not less than \$25 to tide the country over the "transition from war to peace." "Every eligible worker should be entitled to 26 weeks of benefits in any one year, if his employment continues that long," the president said in a message to congress.

Emergency Action He recommended specifically that congress take emergency action to widen the coverage of unemployment compensation and to increase the amount and duration of benefits, at least for the period of the "present emergency period of reconversion." "Basically this can be accomplished only by amending the social security act so as to induce state laws to provide more adequately for anyone who is unemployed."

Postwar Bulwark This recommendation was coupled with the proposed increase in maximum benefit payments in the statement that "decent unemployment benefits would serve as a bulwark against postwar deflation." In connection with the recommendation for \$25 weekly payments, Mr. Truman said "congress will no doubt wish to re-examine the readjustment allowance provisions of the GI bill of rights. All payments should be made through the existing unemployment compensation machinery of the several states, just as payments to veterans are now made." **Population** The population are to be met," it added. In England, political parties began actively campaigning over the national election July 5, the first since 1935. Prime Minister Churchill will go before commons tomorrow with his interim government. In Washington, it was announced that all transportable sick and wounded service men would be brought home from Europe within the next three months, borne by an increasing fleet of hospital ships.

these emphasized by top fuel experts present at the meeting. The fuel supply shortage which was felt here last winter will be more severe this coming winter, it was brought out. Coal strikes in the east have aggravated the situation, since the loss of fuel by strikes cannot be made up.

Transport Tie-Up Concentrated war effort in the Pacific will tie up transportation by rail and truck for military use, curtailing use for civilian fuel transportation needs. The fuel meeting, sponsored by the Klamath chamber of commerce, under the auspices of the Northwest Inter-Agency Solid Fuels commission, discussed next winter's fuel shortage with representatives of lodges and public services, to spread the message among citizens of the necessity of ordering and accepting delivery now. James Miksak of the Opa, Seattle; J. Harry Gatewood, department of the interior, Seattle; William Cannon, of the OPA, Seattle; Walter Thompson, OPA, Portland, were fuel ration agents present. Gatewood emphasized the labor shortage in coal mines, saying that the coal supply will be short this year. Even if the full supply was available, he said, the railroads would not be able to carry it, and retailers would not be able to deliver it after October in any case. The year's supply of whatever fuel is available should be stored by September.

Wood Supply Miksak discussed the wood supply, pointing out that Klamath Falls had 25,000 cords delivered between April, 1944, and April, 1945, 2000 truck loads, 20,000 tons of coal were delivered to civilians, 4000 truckloads were necessary for delivery, coal delivery using more trucks as part loads were ordered often than full loads, increasing the transportation problem. Only 20,000 cords of the 25,000 used were supplied by local mills, 4000 supplied by tapping Eugene, Crosswell, Bend and some California sources. They were still 1000 cords short, and 1946 was a comparatively mild winter.

Need Estimated It is estimated that 28,000 cords would be needed this coming winter and the supply may be 7000 cords short. While Weyerhaeuser is increasing production of prestologs this year, this will only offset the 7000 cord deficit by about 3000 cords. More fuel oil is being used in the Pacific war, Cannon pointed out. The amount required to establish the beachhead on Iwo Jima alone would supply fuel for 45,000 homes. Oil fields secured on Tarakan will supply a mere drop in the bucket for the increased activity in the South Pacific. Fuel oil coupons valid now
