

NOT KILLED, WE HURT AS PLANE CRASHES

DAYTON, O., May 28 (AP)—More than 70,000 persons and an experimental army plane flown by a veteran of 89 missions over Germany, crashed into an automobile at the Wright field yesterday. The pilot and injured crew members were killed.

A crowd, attending a war aviation show, had just cheered as Capt. William W. 28, of Niagara Falls, roared over the field in a plane of the type which has the engine behind the plane suddenly shot to the ground, struck the automobile of Wesley B. Roehm, Leesburg, O., and then fell into a ditch 200 yards from Roehm's automobile. Tire Increase Still Short Of Demands

WASHINGTON, May 28 (AP)—Two millions passenger car tires—and increase of 500,000—will be available in June, but that amount still will fall short of meeting demands. The increase in next month's ration quota will "help a lot," said OPA Ration Chief Max McCullough. He added, however, that a backlog of 500,000 to 600,000 applications for casings, low inventories and a seasonal increase in tire failures will make the quota inadequate. OPA estimates that a 2,000,000 allocation will have to be maintained several consecutive months before any new tires can be made available to "A" car drivers.

Pilot Wanted To Dump Goering Out

MULLAN, Idaho, May 28 (AP)—A U. S. pilot who flew Reichsmarshal Hermann Goering to a meeting with allied chiefs after his capture wrote his wife here that he was sorely tempted to jettison his pompous cargo in midair.

Capt. M. Y. Foster, pilot of the plane in which Goering traveled, said his "rather effeminate" passenger "gave me the creeps."

"I don't know quite what to think of it yet," he wrote. "You can imagine how it seemed up there with that big, fat ape pointing out Munich and such places along the route. Several times I had an impulse to turn the plane over and see if I could shake him out but he was wedged in like a champagne cork."

Few Japanese Return To West Coast Area

TOPAZ, Utah, May 28 (AP)—Slightly less than one-third of the Japanese leaving the 10 U. S. relocation centers are returning to the west coast, Ray B. Haight, acting area supervisor of the war relocation authority, said yesterday. Of 7252 Japanese Americans who have taken advantage of the lifting of the exclusion ban, but 2353 have gone to the west coast. The east has attracted 3206. Few, he said, are remaining near the relocation centers.

CALIFORNIANS IN TAXATION DEADLOCK

SACRAMENTO, May 28 (AP)—Still deadlocked on the proposal sponsored by assembly democrats to cut another half cent off the sales tax, the legislature went into its 13th week today with most of the major issues of the 56th session yet to be settled.

Blocked by the tieup on taxes are scores of special appropriation bills, the \$90,000,000 postwar construction reserve, the issue of public health insurance or the alternative hospitalization plan; several departmental reorganization measures and scores of other important bills.

Conferees representing the two houses continued to seek a compromise on the sales tax issue which would remove the obstacle to passage of the fourth bill, or similar legislation, carrying out Governor Warren's recommendation for continuing the 1943 tax reductions another two years.

McKenzie Pass Opening Delayed

SALEM, May 28 (AP)—McKenzie Pass, on the Trans-Cascade highway between Eugene and Bend, probably will not be reopened for some time, because of deep snow, State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldoock said today. Baldoock said the pass is the only pass on the state highway system that is wind-swept, so that snow is blown back on the road as soon as it is removed.
