The following letter received from a service man in a San Francisco hospital shows why the quota must be filled, she said.

"Dear Friends: I received one of your very nice sleeveless sweaters upon entering the hospital. I was eight days in the hold of a cargo ship with more than 400 other sick men. We had no heat and I wore all the clothes I could get hold of, which was two suits of summer underwear and two suits of dungarees. I was cold all the time. When I arrived at the hospital they gave me a sweater and that sure helped to thaw me out. I wear it every day and appreciate it very much. I want to thank you for it." (Signed) G. K. Wayne.
