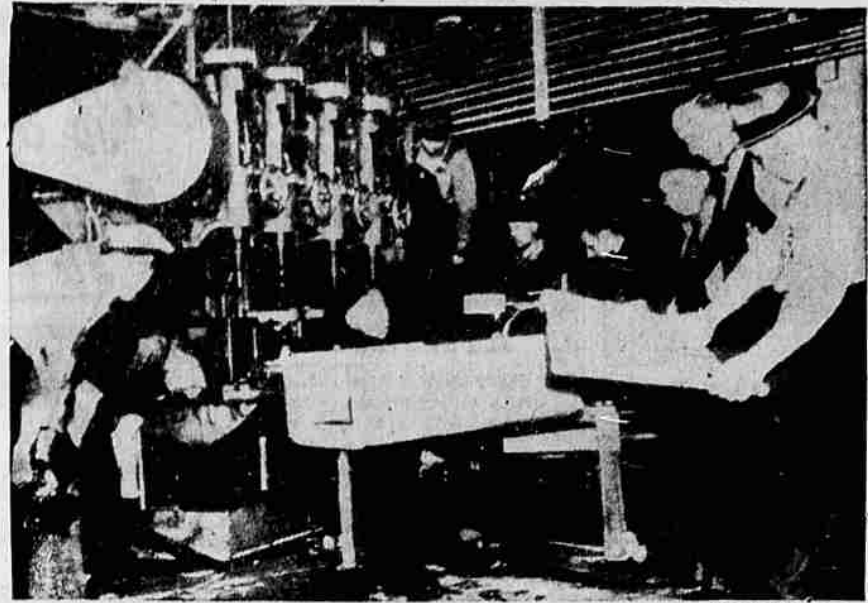
**Canby**

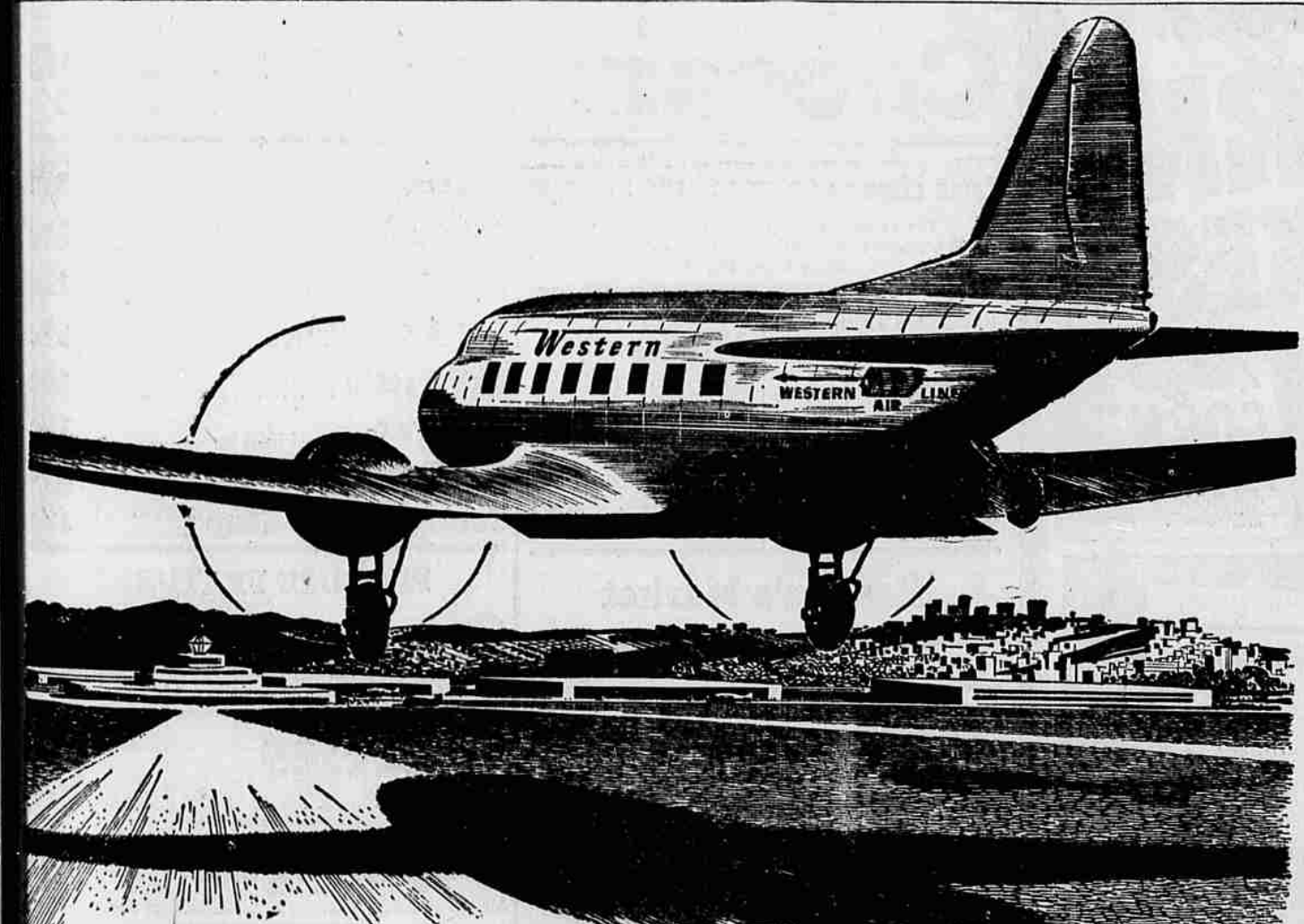
