THERE is an interesting and HOPEFUL development in the news today.

GOVERNMENT REFUSES TO RETIRE ARMY

U. S. Agrees To Sit With Powers As Mediator

LONDON, June 1 (AP)—France refused today to comply with Prime Minister Churchill's request that French troops in Syria retire to their barracks to avoid the possibility of clash with the British, but in a conciliatory move ordered her troops to "cease fire."

WASHINGTON, June 1 (AP)—The forthcoming "Big Three" meeting, the French Levant situation and administration appointments were top subjects at President Truman's weekly news conference today.

On the international situation, President Truman told reporters:
