

# City Briefs

## MAN HELD ON BAD CHECK CHARGE HERE

Lawrence J. Bennett, 46, is in the county jail today in lieu of \$2000 cash bail, charged with forging a bank check for \$120 on H. Douglas Whiteline of Swan lake.

A complaint against Bennett was signed by Nellie Harrington, employe of Frazer's market and grocery at 2317 S. 6th. The forgery is alleged to have occurred on May 1 when Bennett attempted to cash the check at Frazer's. According to the complaint, Bennett attempted to cash the check in Frazer's absence. Nellie Harrington gave him \$50 and told him to return. He failed to do so and was arrested by authorities in Yreka, Calif., on a warrant to the sheriff, and returned to Klamath Falls by the sheriff's office.

Bennett appeared in justice court Thursday and waived preliminary hearing and grand jury indictment. He was returned to the county jail and will be brought before Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg to enter a plea.

## AFL DISAGREEMENT TO BE FILED SOON

TACOMA, June 1 (AP)—The disagreement between two AFL unions, representing Pacific Coast pulp and paper mill workers, and mill operators, will be filed as a dispute case with the conciliation division of the U. S. department of labor at San Francisco today, John Sherman, vice president of the International Brotherhood of Pulp, Sulphite and Paper Mill Workers, said here last night.

Sherman said the filing will be made by the joint bargaining committee of his union and the sister organization, the International Brotherhood of Paper Makers.

The unions and operators met at Portland a week ago and failed to come to an agreement over union requests for wage increases, holidays with pay, higher night shift differentials and employer-paid group insurance.

Sherman said the unions involved represent 17,000 workers in mills in Washington, Oregon and California.

## TRUMANS MAY FACE COOKLESS SUMMER

INDEPENDENCE, Mo., June 1 (AP)—Because Vietta Garr is "sort of on the outs with the cooking right now," the Trumans may have to find a new cook for the summer White House here.

Vietta, a negro, cooked for the president's family for 16 years and said she has been asked by a relative of the Trumans to quit her soda fountain job in a chain drug store and resume working for them.

"I don't know—they're a nice family to work for but I'm sort of on the outs with the cooking right now," Vietta said. "I'm going to make up my mind after I talk with Mrs. Truman."

She said she could still make the angel food cakes President Truman likes.

Mrs. Truman is expected to arrive this weekend to supervise spring house cleaning.

Although produce was saved, damaged machinery will delay ice manufacture, said Company Secretary Paul Henningsen.

## Merchants To Decide On Closing Stores

PORTLAND, June 1 (AP)—Individual merchants will decide whether to close their doors one or more days weekly because of meat scarcity, the Independent Retail Meat Dealers' association voted last night.

Some speakers said shops should stay open because of an obligation to customers. Association President M. H. Wolf said about one-fourth of the area's shops now close one day.

The meat dealers endorsed a request to the war food administration and OPA for a "point holiday" on lamb during heavy marketing.

## No Added Supplies Of Fuel Oil Seen

WASHINGTON, June 1 (AP)—The petroleum administration for war cautioned the Pacific northwest today against expecting more civilian fuel oil supplies.

Increased military requirements, plus transportation difficulties, make it necessary to continue present restrictions until Japan's defeat, PAW said.
