LAKEVIEW — The death of Roy Monroe Chandler, a lifelong resident of Lakeview and Crooked Creek, occurred Sunday at his home in Lakeview, where he had been living for the past several months. He was 60 years at time of passing and had been in ill health for some time.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. S. B. Chandler, two prominent Lake county pioneers, he was born April 28, 1885 on the same ranch which he owned at the time of his death. He attended the Crooked Creek school and was joined in marriage to Pauline Snyder March 14, 1909.

He was a member of the Thomas Creek Grange and B. P. O. E.

Survivors are his wife, Pauline, two sons, Doyle of Lakeview and Pvt. Paul Chandler of Fort Riley, Kansas, who was here for the funeral; one brother, George of Lakeview; four sisters, Mrs. May Ahlstrom, Lake Grove, Ore., Mrs. Lottie Simms and Mrs. Gladys Gunther, Lakeview and Mrs. Lora Newton, Portland, and two granddaughters, Patsy and Polly.

Urgency Rating Given To Repair Recruiting

SAN FRANCISCO, June 2 (AP)—A No. 1 urgency rating was given to recruitment of 20,000 skilled workers to aid repair of battle-damaged navy craft in Pacific coast shipyards yesterday by manpower directors of western states.

F. W. Hunter, WMC regional director, said "every state in the union is engaged in this worker-hunt for skilled journeymen electricians, machinists, sheet metal workers, pipefitters, boiler-makers and thousands of semi-skilled vacancies—needed to recommission vital U. S. fleet units."

EUGENE, June 2 (AP)—More than 200,000,000 feet of urgently needed lumber items for use in the Pacific war will go on the auction block here June 7-8. H. J. Cox, secretary-manager of the Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association, announced.

Oregon and Washington lumbermen will attend the auction, conducted by the WPB central procurement agency.

11 Missionaries, Boy Beheaded

NEW YORK, June 2 (AP)—The American Baptist Foreign Mission society reported today that 11 Baptist missionaries and a nine-year-old boy were beheaded by the Japanese in 1943 on Tanay island in the Philippines. The executions occurred Dec. 19 or 20, 1943, but the society said it had not received permission from the war and state departments until now to make the information public.

Those put to death had fled to a mountain refuge which they named Hopewell, in order to carry on their "preaching, teaching and healing mission" after the Japanese invasion, the society said.

Portland Suffers Least From Lack

PORTLAND, June 2 (AP)—Portland, where only veal and bacon are comparatively scarce, is suffering less from the food shortage than any other Pacific coast city, the bureau of labor statistics regional director reported.

William A. Bledsoe said canned pineapple juice was the only hard-to-find processed food here.

All kinds of meat are lacking in California, also margarine and shortenings, he reported. Seattle has a serious meat shortage, with shortenings nearly unobtainable, Bledsoe said.

Forger Walks Away From State Prison

SALEM, June 2 (AP)—William Byrd Boorman, 25, Josephine county forger, left the state prison last night, walking away from the prison boiler house. Prison Warden George Alexander said today.

Boorman, a trusty in the prison flax gang night crew, was missed at the 2 a. m. check-up. Alexander said he could not estimate the exact time Boorman left.

Boorman entered the prison March 10, 1944, to serve three years for forgery. His application for parole was denied a few weeks ago because he had a prior criminal record.

He is 5 feet 5 1/2 inches tall, weighs 130 pounds, has brown hair and brown eyes, and was wearing overalls.

Klamath Infantry Officer Awarded Silver Star Medal

The Silver Star for gallantry has been awarded Lt. Fred Eyerly, Klamath Falls man who served with the infantry through the campaign in Italy.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Eyerly of 1968 Earle street. He was born in Spokane, and attended grade and high school here, graduating from KUHS in 1940. He attended Oregon State college and was managing editor of the Barometer in his last year. He was a member of the original Boy Scout troop here and is an Eagle scout.

Lt. Eyerly's gallantry and heroism in an assault at Romito, Italy, won him the honor. He was leading his platoon at the time.

Lt. Eyerly's platoon ran into intense and accurate artillery and mortar fire, according to the citation, which continues as follows:

"He led his platoon through the zone of fire, moving about among his men at great risk to

his life and urging them to quickly clear the barrage area. He then led them in the final assault, against strong enemy opposition, and took his objective ahead of other platoons. He received a shrapnel wound in the shoulder, but continued to move about in the exposed and heavily pounded area, and led his men in further assaults. He remained with the platoon,
