...set of decrees, purporting to assure the national defense, but actually used to suppress any criticism. Numerous prominent citizens have been arrested; several newspapers have been closed; articles of newspapers were read by informants here as if they were in the presence of newspaper readers in Argentina. Nothing of the kind has occurred in the United States since the Farrel government. Persons here who have opposed the regime estimate that the jails still hold some 100 political prisoners, only 10 of whom, they say, were sympathizers.

SPRING LAKE MAN COMMITS SUICIDE

Andrew N. Folsom, 42, took his own life Friday at his home on Spring Lake by placing a barrel of a .22 pump rifle in his mouth and pulling the trigger. The body was discovered about 10 p. m. yesterday by his brother-in-law, E. G. Folsom, a resident of the Spring Lake district, who notified the sheriff's office in Klamath Falls.

Folsom had been dead about 12 hours when the body was discovered, according to authorities. No cause for the suicide was known by relatives. Folsom is survived by his wife, Clarice Folsom of Spring Lake, one son, James Walter Folsom, USN; four daughters, Mildred Atkinson, Elizabeth Ann Folsom, Rosemary Folsom, and Agnes Folsom, all of Sacramento, Calif.; three sons, Mrs. Agnes Dolan of Stockton, Calif., Mrs. Zelma Parker of Spring Lake, and James McFarland of Klamath Falls; one brother, Ernest Madera, Madera, Calif.; and mother, Mrs. Millie Folsom of Klamath Falls. Pope Expresses Hope For New German Life, Dignity

...of the status of the Catholic church in Germany." As Archbishop Eugenio Pacelli, the Pope was sent as nuncio to the German kaiser with a Vatican peace plan in 1917 and remained as envoy to the German republic until 1929.

...Set Up Barrier

The pope declared that by concluding his 1933 concordat with the Nazi government the Vatican "did everything possible to set up a formidable barrier to the spread of ideas at once subversive and violent." Previous German-Vatican accords had not provided adequate guarantees of freedom of faith to Catholics, the pope added.

...It was not that the church for her part had any illusions built on excessive optimism or that, in concluding the concordat, she had any intention of giving any form of approval to the teachings or tendencies of national socialism," he stated. The concordat, he said, provided Catholics, "a juridical basis for their defense and a stronghold behind which to shield themselves in their opposition," in spite of "all violations to which it was subjected."

...don before it was received by the French government. The communique, announcing the cease fire order in Syria "to give satisfaction to the request of the British government, added:

Favorable Air

"In the opinion of the French government it was a question of creating if possible an atmosphere more favorable for conversations with the American and British governments and eventually with governments of the various Arab states—conversations concerning the whole situation in the near east."

...At Damascus President Shukri Quwatli of Syria was reported to have sent messages of thanksgiving to Churchill and President Truman for the cessation of fighting there. Quwatli told a neutral diplomat Syria would be willing to treat with France on conditions, which include:

...All "troupes speciales," which are approximately 18,000 Syrian levies under French command, must be placed under Syrian control and the French command must be terminated.
