

Leathernecks Split 2 Tilts With Sailor Nine, 7-1; 0-9

Chapin Holds Navy Club To Three Hits In Opener; Patterson Blanks Marines

The Marine and Navy baseball teams, after two weeks of postponements, finally had a chance to open the season with a couple of games over the weekend and the question as to which is the better club is still unsolved. The Marines copped the Saturday affair at the air station 7-1 behind the three-hit pitching of "Hy" Chapin and on Sunday at Recreation park, the Navy's Bob Patterson hurled a four-hit game to shut out the Leathernecks, 9-0.

Saturday's game went seven and a half innings before the all too familiar rain frowned on the scene, but by that time the Marines had chalked up seven runs at the expense of Chief Norm Worthley, veteran pitcher for the Sailors. Worthley had a slow start, the Marines clouting him for most of their hits in the first three innings, but after the storm was passed, he settled down and pitched deceptive ball.

Batters Unbalanced
"Hy" Chapin kept the Navy batters off balance all afternoon with his change of pace ball and wound up the tussle with nine strike outs to his credit and one lone unearned run.

Sunday was a complete turn-about. For the first inning it looked like the 700 odd fans were in for a classic, both pitchers holding their own with the three up, three away story, but in the second, the air station lads found the mark and rapped out seven runs with four hits off Mitchell Paige. Paige generally throws a ball with plenty of stuff but the Sailors were finding his hooks and drops ideal pitches for safe blows.

Sutton Takes Over
Sutton came into the game to relieve Paige and held the sailors in check, allowing only two runs during his seven innings on the mound. Fifteen navy batters went down before his barrage of curves, and only seven proved themselves able to glean more hits.

Wildlife Program Extended

Increase in the continental duck population has prompted the federal government to extend its wildlife restoration program by purchase, over the country's far-flung waterfowl flyways, of additional feeding and resting areas for migratory birds, it is reported in the Ducks Unlimited Quarterly.

The program, largely financed by arms and ammunition taxes, provides for expenditure of \$1,357,810 for 210 projects.

Chief among them are 73 land-acquisition projects approximating 50,000 acres costing \$506,958; 58 development projects obligating \$384,474; and 51 research projects costing \$378,474.

Such areas, either already suitable or capable of being developed, are planned for operation as waterfowl refuges or combination refuges and controlled public shooting grounds.

College Baseball Coaches To Form National Association

HAMILTON, N. Y., June 4 (AP)—A national association of college baseball coaches will be organized in New York City June 29-30 by Eppy Barnes of Colgate and Joe Bedenk of Penn State.

A survey of 682 colleges showed only 242 were actively competing in baseball.

Bradley Old Timer At Derby

LOUISVILLE, June 4 (AP)—E. R. Bradley, nearing his 88th birthday, will be the only old-timer among the owners in more ways than one when a dozen or so 3-year-olds spring away from the barrier in the 71st Kentucky derby at Churchill Downs Saturday.

The veteran turfman, who is gradually retiring from the turf of which he has been a prominent part for more than a quarter century, not only outranks the other owners in years but his green and white silks have been carried in more derbies than all the remainder combined.

Will Not See Derby
Ill health will prevent him from seeing his Burning Dream attempt to enter the winner's circle occupied in past years by such Bradley greats as Broker's Tip, Burgeo King, Bubbling Over and Behave Yourself. Until last Saturday's Blue Grass stake in which he finished ninth, the son of Bimelech was one of the favorites. Today, however, his backers from the Blue Grass country are more hopeful than confident.

Won Four Derbies
Although Bradley has won four derbies, the best percentage mark is held by Warren Wright's Calumet farm. His red-devil silks have been in four post parades and twice, last year with Penive, and in 1941 with Whirlaway, they have been in front at the end of the journey. Wright will bid for this year's pot of gold with Pot O'Luck, a son of Chance Play whose staying powers are not questioned. Whether he has the necessary speed remains to be proven.

Four Have Had Starters
Col. C. V. (Sonny) Whitney, owner of the favored Jeep; Lt. Com. T. D. Buhl, who'll send out Fair Sailer; H. C. Hatch with Fair Jester and Charles S. Howard, represented by Sea Swallow, are the only other owners who have ever had a derby starter. Whitney's Eton blue and brown capped colors were carried to victory as far back as 1914 by Regret but in those days the silks were owned by his father, Harry Payne Whitney.

Cooke, Lewis Take Doubles Crown

The San Francisco duo reached the finals earlier in the day by defeating former Davis cup star, Francis X. Shields, and Johnny Sisson 6-8, 5-7, 6-3, 6-4.

The women's doubles title went to Louise Brough, Beverly Hills, and Margaret Osborne, San Francisco, national doubles champions, who won from Gertrude Moran and Jane Stanton Gallagher, both of Los Angeles, 10-8, 6-2.

Cards Take Twin Bill From Giants

Giants' Lead Cut To 3 1/2 Games; Yankees Split Two Tilts With Tribe, 8-2; 1-4

The National League's four eastern clubs today had lost their faith in Horace Greeley's advice to young men to go west.

After yesterday's debacle when they lost six of seven games (one was suspended because of Pennsylvania's curfew law) the senior loop's eastern teams left the inopportune west with an embarrassing record of only 17 victories in 52 games. This compares with the American league's western clubs showing in the east of 23 wins against 30 defeats.

Giants' Lead Cut Down
The league-leading New York Giants won six and lost eight in the west. This sub .300 ball cut their once eight-game lead to 3 1/2 games over the second place Pirates who won 12 of their last 14, nine against the east.

The World Champion St. Louis Cardinals edged into third place by winning nine of their last 14 games, including yesterday's doubleheader from the Giants 11-3 and 8-2.

Charley (Red) Barrett, whom the Redbirds received from Boston in the Mort Cooper deal, accounted for his third straight victory in the opener. His mates collected 15 hits off four Giant hurriers, with Shortstop Marty Marion driving in six runs on two hits. Ted Wilks handed the Giants their seventh loss in the last nine games by holding the Ottmen to six scattered hits in the nightcap.

Reds Trip Bums Twice
Cincinnati's Reds extended their winning streak to eight straight by downing Brooklyn twice 6-2 and 3-1. The double triumph placed them on an even .500 basis making six teams in the loop with .500 or better.

Joe Bowman, acquired from Boston's Red Sox last week on waivers, spaced eight hits to triumph in his first start for the Reds, while Frank Dasso dropped the Brooks into fourth place with a six-hitter.

The Pirates took their third straight one-run decision from Philadelphia 7-6 in the opener of a twin-bill. The second contest was halted by Penn's 7 p. m. curfew law with the Phillies leading 11-9 after six innings. The game will be concluded July 12 when the two teams clash again at Pittsburgh.

Boston's Braves gained the

east's only victory, defeating the Chicago Cubs 2-1 in the opener and dropping the nightcap 3-1. Bob Logan spaced 11 hits effectively to gain his second triumph in the first game, while Claude Passeau spun a gaudy two-hitter in the afterpiece.

The first place New York Yankees retained their two-game lead over the runner-up Detroit Tigers in the American league by dividing two games with Cleveland. The Yankees won the opener 8-2 for Hank Borowy's seventh triumph against one loss, and the Indians annexed the nightcap 4-1 behind Steve Gromek's six hitter.

Portland Leads Pack By 2 1/2 Games; Head For California And Series With L. A.

Portland's Beavers, over the hump in their crucial series with Seattle and leading the Pacific Coast league pack by two and a half games, head toward California this week along with the Rainiers.

The northwest teams split a Sunday twin bill after Seattle had taken Saturday's tilt. In their California invasion the Rainiers will tackle San Francisco while the Beavers take on Los Angeles.

Oakland retained its grip on third place by copping Saturday's encounter with the Seals and splitting a Sunday doubleheader. San Diego regained fifth spot by knocking off Sacramento twice Sunday after losing in 11 innings Saturday. Los Angeles made it three in a row over Hollywood in weekend clashes.

Pulford Beats Rainiers
Don Pulford yielded seven singles in hurling Portland to a 5-2 win in Sunday's opener while Joe Demoran and Syl Johnson shared a five-hit exhibition in Seattle's 2-1 nightcap victory. The Rainiers took Saturday's game 5-4. Weekend results gave the Beavers a 5-3 edge in the series.

Demoran, after tossing two-hit ball for three innings, met misfortune when he was knocked unconscious by a thrown ball in a play at second base. The team physician, after an examination, said the accident would not interfere with the moundman accompanying the Rainiers southward.

Hayes Blankes Seals 2-0
Damon Hayes of the Acorns turned in one of the best pitching performances of the day Sunday when he blanked San Francisco 2-0 with five hits in the first game. Elmer Orella and Bob Joyce teamed to clinch the nightcap for the Seals 7-2. Oakland took Saturday's encounter 6-5. San Francisco copped the series 5-3.

Carl Dumler of San Diego chalked up his 10th victory of the season against five defeats in beating Sacramento 4-3 in the initial tilt Sunday. Vic Munzo registered his first victory for the Padres since being purchased from Oakland, winning the nightcap 4-3. Sacramento beat the Padres 9-3 in 11 innings Saturday, with the series winding up in a 4-4 draw.

Angels Get Twin Kill
At Los Angeles Sunday the steady twirling of Charley Cuelier and Red Adams gave the Angels a twin kill 7-0 and 4-3. It was Cuelier's eighth win against six defeats and Adams' eighth victory against five losses. Los Angeles edged out the Twinks Saturday 9-8 and had a 5-2 margin in their series.
