**Kujawski To Return To Home In City**

In a long distance phone call from Pendleton, Ore., Mrs. Patricia Kujawski of 924 Martin in Klamath Falls, learned that her husband, S/Sgt. Charles S. Kujawski of the United States army infantry has arrived in this country, and is expected home sometime this week.

Kujawski was first reported as missing in action on October 4, 1944, in Germany, and was later listed as a prisoner of the German government on November 17. He was liberated from the German prison camp on the first day of May.

He entered the service in November 4, 1943, and prior to that time, was employed by the Klamath Lumber company, and was a member of the local fire department. The son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Golski of Ohio, he has been overseas since July of 1944.

Kujawski is the father of a three-year-old son, Charles Jr.

**Powers Pleads Not Guilty Of Larceny**
