ANDERSON HOME
 Lt. Andy Anderson, MO. 1/c, is home from Europe on a 30-day leave, wearing a star for participation in the invasion of Normandy, D-Day invasion of Normandy, and the capture of the city of Bonham, 3744 La Verne, as a member of the crew of the PT boat. He has been in the service for 14 months, part of the time engaged in battles in the Pacific. He wears the Medal of Honor. Anderson enlisted in September, 1942, and chose the P-T boat. He returned to the States May 19, 1945, and is in Klamath Falls May 20.

On the morning of the invasion, Anderson said, the boats were there to protect the landing barges. They had overhead cover by allied planes, and met with no opposition during landing operations, June 6, 1944.

Anderson's brother Willard is a second class stationed at a navy training school in Mississippi. Andy reports back duty to Boston for reassignment.

Veteran Pacific fighters aboard the ship consider the recent action among the severest of the war. Sometimes day and night were broken by only short pauses for food and rest. Planes were fueled, armed, launched, then landed and at once prepared to fight again.
