RESTRICTIONS ON BUDGETING EYED AT MEET

New state laws restricting expenditures from reserves to actual budgeted items were reviewed at Monday night's council meeting.

It was brought out that hereafter, all expenditures must be budgeted—whether they come out of current funds or reserves—and that no more than the budget can be used for any expressed purpose. The reserves may not be touched outside the budgets.

A number of municipal divisions have reserve funds which have been occasionally drawn upon for various purposes which have come up after budgets were drawn. The new law outlaws such procedure, and when the budget committee meets Friday night it is planned to include all expenditures from reserves in next year's financial schedule. The city's fiscal year is from July 1 to July 1.

The city milk ordinance requiring a gallonage fee for all milk delivered in the city came under discussion as Dr. Calvin Hunt brought out that although Klamath Creamery has paid on all gallonage delivered, Lost River has only paid the fee on 26,000 gallons delivered in the city proper and no fee on the 30,000 gallons delivered to the Marine Barracks and naval air station.
