MERRILL—Cpl. Thomas W. Chaburn Jr., serving with the 5th infantry, 71st division, under Gen. Patton, was with the troops that liberated the prisoners from the work camp at Lambach, Austria, and in a letter to his wife, Helen Hodges Chaburn, Merrill, confirmed the horror scenes that our army found there.

Prior to entering the service he was employed in the Merrill branch, First National Bank of Portland. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Tom Chaburn, also reside here.

His reference to the camp, written May 11, follows: "A work camp for prisoners, run by S. S. troops, just a short distance from Lambach on main road.

"The camp is divided into two main parts, both made up of small log barracks with no floors.

"The first part is the main part of the camp where prisoners were quartered while work-

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OF SCHOOL ELECTION UPON THE QUESTION OF INCREASING THE TAX LEVY OVER THE AMOUNT PROVIDED IN ARTICLE XI, STATE CONSTITUTION

THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 1, OF KLAMATH COUNTY, OREGON, IN SAID SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 1, ON THE 15th DAY OF JUNE, 1945, FROM THE HOUR OF TWO O'CLOCK, P. M. TO THE HOUR OF SEVEN O'CLOCK, P. M., FOR THE PURPOSE OF SUBMITTING TO THE VOTERS OF SAID SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 1, THE QUESTION OF INCREASING THE TAX LEVY FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING ON THE 30th DAY OF JULY, 1946, OVER THE AMOUNT LIMITED BY SECTION 11, ARTICLE XI, OF THE STATE CONSTITUTION OF OREGON.

Reasons for increasing such levy are:

1. Increased cost of instruction
2. Increased cost of operation
3. Increased cost of maintenance and repairs
