inals "will be kept in close confinement and stern control."

Jackson said the preparations for the prosecution of major war criminals will not impede or delay trials of other offenders guilty of lesser crimes.

Plans Underway He said negotiations for an international military tribunal, representing the United States, the United Kingdom, Soviet Russia and France, to try guilty nazis have not yet been completed, but that he did not consider it wise to wait this final step before preparing the American case.

of potatoes are being girdled. This will undoubtedly result in reduced stems and decreased yields.

Lower Yields Lateness in planting will also contribute to lower yields, and stands also will doubtless be reduced to some extent by rotting seed pieces, causing plants to be weakened.

In a few cases, portions of some fields are still too wet to be planted. However, if the weather should turn warm and remain so, these fields might still be planted, other acreages would recover and the harvest picture would not look so dark.

In summing up results of the four weeks wet weather, somewhat reduced stands and late planting may reduce the average yields considerably, Henderson said.

Tried To Flee In New York, where the three held there were arraigned last night, U. S. Attorney John F. X. McGohey said Gayn was "apparently trying to flee the country" when he was taken into custody at his home.

Each was released under \$10,000 bail each, and their cases adjourned until June 20.

Roth, Larsen and Service were arraigned in Washington before U. S. Commissioner Needham C. Turnace early today. Turnace fixed the same bail and adjourned their cases to June 14.

Conviction on the charge carries a maximum penalty of two years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

Given To Jaffe The FBI said its investigation was begun at the request of the state and navy departments and "disclosed that data removed from the government's confidential files usually was turned over to Jaffe at meetings in Washington and New York."

Some of this information, the FBI said, was printed in Amerasia magazine, but the bureau declined comment on what use, if any, was made of the remainder.

A state department statement issued at the same time the FBI was announcing the arrests last night said that "a few months ago it became apparent that information of a secret character was reaching unauthorized persons not only from the department of state but from the department of the navy as well," and added:

Truman Favors Salary Increase

WASHINGTON, June 7 (AP)—President Truman today declared himself in favor of increasing salaries of congress members to \$15,000 to \$25,000 a year. They now receive \$10,000.

The president said he would not veto legislation to allow house members \$2500 expense money. He said, however, that he thought they should come out for a straight-out increase in their salaries and that he would sign the bill if they did.

the agreements as laying the economic foundation for lasting peace. The opposition, in two days of house debate, described the monetary plan as "a swindle and a fraud" and as an international WPA.

The United States is the first of the United Nations to act on the agreements.

Prior to its final action today the house beat down 325 to 29 a motion by Rep. Sumner (R-Ill.), a leader of the opposition, to send the ratification legislation back to the banking committee with instructions that all provisions for an international monetary stabilization fund be eliminated.

Another balloon is reported to have dropped a bomb in an irrigation ditch, and then floated on its way.

One balloon was brought down by an airplane after it was caught in the slipstream of the plane. It was well preserved and gave officials an excellent subject for study.

Locale of these authentic balloon finds is withheld from publication under censorship rulings.

weeks. First the Russian delegation waited for its original instructions on the veto issue, and then the United States sought to get Moscow to reconsider its views.

The Big Five met late yesterday but the subject was not discussed. Instead the Russian, American, British, French and Chinese delegation chiefs dealt with relatively minor issues, getting final agreement on a French amendment designed merely to strengthen protection already proposed under the world charter for treaties against enemy states of this war.

BEFORE her people become accustomed to their new powers and opportunities and responsibilities.

We're always afraid of the new because of what it may do to that which is older. This fear of the new is rooted very deeply in human nature.

THERE is an interesting note from the Philippines today, where the newly assembling Filipino legislature has received and is apparently expected to pass a bill granting to the United States such military bases in the islands as we may need.

The Filipinos, you see, have known us long enough to begin to have some CONFIDENCE in us. In addition, they have had the opportunity to compare us with the Japs.

WHEN we and the Russians have known each other longer, it will be far easier for us to get along together. If we can avoid a clash long enough, and if our dealings in the meantime can be fair enough, many of the situations that now look dark and threatening will probably clear up.

OFFERING a shivery touch of what might have been (and may yet be in the world) Major de Seversky says in Paris today that when peace came the Germans had a four-engined JET plane with which they planned to do round-trip bombing of New York.
