## MORE CASES HANDLED BY COMMISSION

The Klamath county welfare commission has been handling an appreciably greater number of cases this year than last. Altha Urquhart, administrator, said this morning that increasing financial allocations of the commission are necessarily related to the increased cost of living.

There is no longer a ceiling on old age assistance grants due to the passage of a state law

abolishing the ceiling effective June 15, 1945, she said. The program is already operating and grants are being established under the new law. The only restriction on grants to aged persons is that the grant be based upon an established need of the individual, she continued.

Persons are not eligible for any set pension sum, she stated, but for only that amount which is actually needed by the applicant. There has been a misunderstanding on the matter of a set pension sum in the past, she declared, with applicants under the erroneous impression that they were entitled to \$40 as a pension.

Under the aid to dependent children program which is financed by federal, state and county funds, the welfare commission here handled 19 cases involving 61 children with a total of \$1650 granted for aid in May of 1945. In April, 1945, there were 18 cases involving 61 children in which \$1497 was paid

for support and in May of 1944 there were 14 cases involving 42 children in which \$1224 was granted.

Under the old age assistance program also financed by federal, state, and county funds, 244 cases were handled by the commission in May, 1945 at a cost of \$8281. In April, 1945, a total of 245 cases were handled at a cost of \$8571 and in May, 1944, there were 229 cases costing \$7461.

Aid to the blind is financed by federal, state and county funds and the welfare commission handled three cases under this program in May, 1945 at a cost of \$164 for aid. There were also three cases in April, 1945 at a cost of \$164 and three cases in May, 1944 receiving \$131 for assistance.

The general assistance program is financed by state and county funds and 97 cases were handled in May of 1945 at a cost of \$4975.72. Ninety-two cases received a total of \$4955.62 in

April, 1945 and 88 cases came to the attention of the commission in May of 1944 in which \$3405.13 was granted for assistance.

Finally, there are service cases in which no funds are allocated. Service includes the counselling of families and children, service to the social security board, and adoptional reports.

In May, 1945, a total of 134 cases were handled with 151 being considered in April of this year.

These figures indicate the fact that more persons are applying to the welfare commission for aid this year than was the case

in 1944 and that the average financial grant has increased to a definite extent over last year.
