RULES GROUP TO DECIDE ON LOBBY QUERY

SACRAMENTO, June 7 (AP)—Whether the California assembly will take Governor Warren's tip and institute an investigation into charges of improper lobbying depended primarily today upon the attitude of the rules committee and this, Chairman S. L. Collins indicated, may not be known for a day or two.

The proposal introduced yesterday to create a "committee on influences on legislation" was taken under advisement by the rules committee after a hearing at which it was warmly supported by several of its eight co-authors.

The committee's recommendation, Chairman Collins said, will not be made known until it acts on all pending requests for the appointment of interim committees.

Authors of the demand for an inquiry into lobbying, financed by a \$5000 allocation as Assemblymen Stewart, Beck, Anderson, Guthrie, Knight, Geddes, Davis, George Collins and Burke, said, "There isn't a man here, Stewart said at the hearing, 'who doesn't realize it is necessary to find out the facts about this situation.'

The senate social welfare committee tabled bills which would have repealed the employees' 1 per cent contribution to the unemployment insurance fund and allowed unemployment payments when disability was the reason for unemployment. Also voted down was legislation to increase unemployment payments in ratio to the number of dependents a claimant had to support.

Northwesterners Aid In Radium Removal

SALZBURG, Germany, June 7 (AP)—Two Pacific northwest men helped in the removal of one and seven-tenths grams of radium, said to be one-third of Europe's total supply, from its hiding place in an old magnesium mine near Hallein recently.

They were Cpl. William Janssen, Seattle, and Sgt. John Vanebo, of Newberg, Ore.
