

AT MARKET MAY ROSE IN TULELAKE

Tulelake is getting about one-third as much meat as is needed, and the situation is believed more acute because of distance from production points. Interstate is prevented unless the federal inspection.

Supply of meat was scarce last Thursday, and was not until Saturday. Veal is not available. Pork is more lamb and mutton, but tastes don't seem to come from Fall River.

Tulelake Church Celebrates 10th Anniversary Sunday

TULELAKE — Sunday, June 10, marks the tenth anniversary of the organization of the Tulelake Community Presbyterian church and in commemoration of that day members of the church will hold a special service Sunday morning at the usual worship hour followed by a potluck dinner in the annex. Four Klamath county speakers, all familiar with the history of the church will be present. They are W. F. Jinnette, Merrill, W. Sanders, Dr. George Wright and Attorney Henry Perkins, all of Klamath Falls.

Early in the history of the Tulelake community, two Sunday schools were organized, one on the east side of the basin in June, 1929, the second on the west side in September of the same year. Organization was completed under Rev. Stanley Jewell, who at that time was serving churches of Merrill, Malin and the Sunday school here, all in the Lost River parish.

Officers of the first Sunday school were Mrs. May Finchum, superintendent, Stanley Jewell, assistant, Mrs. Walter England, secretary and Velma Trammel, treasurer.

The lots upon which the church later was to be built were purchased in 1931 and presented as a future building site for the church by Rev. Jewell, to whom much of the credit goes for the successful institution that now serves this community.

The planning committee, composed of Rev. Jewell, Cecil Buell, D. W. Turnbaugh, J. O. Knudson and W. H. Weitkamp, laid the ground for actual construction that got under way December 1, 1931, and the cornerstone was laid December 27.

In July of the following year the two Sunday school groups joined forces for the nucleus of the present church. Dr. Theodore A. Smith and Judge George Grizzle, both of Klamath Falls, were the speakers at the dedication service.

Formal organization of the church came June 10, 1935, under Rev. H. L. Weir, Malin, Rev. Forrest Travaille, Merrill, and Dr. Smith, Klamath Falls. There were 29 charter members.

The building originally built for a garage was improved in 1937 and has since been used as a home for the pastor. The following year, construction was started on the annex, a two story wing that, since completion, has been at the disposal of many of the civic and social organizations of the entire community.

All work on this part of the church was donated and completed under the direction of Karl Gentry, Tulelake contractor, who furnished equipment for the project.

The church has two outstanding organizations, the Women's Guild and the Young People's Christian Endeavor, the latter group having functioned continuously since 1936, a unique record for this age group. The guild came into being in 1938 and has been largely responsible for many of the extensive improve-

ments made in the building and the grounds.

The annex building has kitchen and serving accommodations for more than 100 persons and the guild has for many months been responsible for luncheons for the Tulelake Rotary club.

This part of the church is at the disposal of the Tulelake grange, the Masonic lodge, C. of R. of the Rainbow for Girls, Tulelake assembly, the DeMolay and on numerous occasions has been used by other churches for large gatherings. Here too are held many of the wedding receptions in the community.

Plans for future expansion of the church are already in the formative stage, with the present committee, Rev. Hugh L. Bronson, George W. Osborne, D. W. Turnbaugh, H. T. Street, S. F. Terry, Mrs. A. E. Ryckman and Mildred Reid looking forward to the enlargement of the church and annex.

The list of ministers who have served the local parish of whom Rev. Bronson was the first individual pastor includes Rev. Stanley Jewell, Rev. H. L. Weir, R. H. Stevenson, Rev. Hugh Bronson, Rev. Merle Ramage, and Rev. George Almond. Rev. Bronson, who came first to the church in May of 1937, remained until December of 1939, when he left to enter missionary work in eastern Oregon. He returned here in November, 1942 and still serves.

The anniversary service to be held Sunday morning will be followed by a potluck dinner in the annex and at this time any information on past history of the church will be welcomed in order that the records may be completed.

NLRB GIVES RULING ON COOS BAY LABOR

WASHINGTON, June 8 (AP)—A bargaining unit at Coos Bay, Ore., Lumber company will include certain workers with supervisory duties, the national labor relations board has ruled, ordering a collective bargaining election by July 4.

Because of logging custom, bull bucks, hook tenders, the truck foreman, and others with limited supervisory authority should be represented, the board said. The decision upheld a CIO, International Woodworkers of America petition.

The Coos Bay company had argued that these supervisors should be barred from the election.

An assertion that the decision would eliminate barriers between workers and management came from Gerard D. Reilly in a dissenting opinion. Men with similar jobs in other camps have not had hiring and firing power, he said.
