

OREGON CITY LAUNCHED AT EASTERN YARD

QUINCY, Mass., June 3 (AP)—The new heavy cruiser, USS Oregon City, was launched today at the Quincy shipyard of the Bethlehem Steel company, with Bing Crosby, radio and screen star, and members of a special subcommittee of the house naval affairs committee attending.

Crosby was here to lend his support to the 7th War Loan drive and the house naval affairs subcommittee members were en route to Maine to inspect naval establishments. The group was headed by Rep. Mott (R-Ore.), ranking minority member of the full committee.

Crosby accompanied Massachusetts governor, Maurice J. Tobin, to the launching.

The 13,000-ton vessel, first to bear the name of the far western city, was sponsored by Mrs. Raymond P. Caulfield, Oregon City, wife of the city commissioner of that community.

The Oregon City was named in accordance with the navy's policy of designating its heavy cruisers for United States cities and the capitals of American possessions and territories.

She is a flush-decked vessel of the Baltimore class, with a main battery of nine 8-inch guns in triple turrets.

\$645,000 In Public Projects Considered

SALEM, June 3 (AP)—Public works projects valued at \$645,000 are in prospect for Oregon after the war, the state post-war committee said yesterday.

The total includes \$280,483,500 to be spent by army engineers, \$102,633,200 for irrigation projects, and \$51,206,000 for the Bonneville project.

The committee said public works projects can employ from 2000 to 50,000 men in the immediate postwar years, but that private industry will have to find jobs for 50,000 to 75,000 men.

SENTENCING SET ON THEFT CHARGE

Clarence M. Thompson of Malin was arraigned on two charges, both dealing with larceny from a warehouse, before Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg this morning. Thompson has been lodged in the county jail in lieu of \$5000 bail and waived preliminary hearing and grand jury indictment. He pleaded guilty to both charges and June 12 was set for the day of sentencing by Judge Vandenberg.

Thompson was charged with entering the Malin Cheese factory on May 29, 1945 and stealing two hind quarters of beef weighing 140 pounds, belonging

to G. E. Smith and son of Malin. He was also charged with stealing one hog, dressed, weighing 150 pounds, property of Steyskal of Malin.
