Artists Presented In Recital Tuesday

On Tuesday evening, June 5, Mrs. A. J. Voyer presented her voice students in a varied program at the First Presbyterian church, with guest artists including Mrs. Lewis Hornby, violinist, and Madelon Adler, pianist.

Customarily, a reviewer attends such an evening prepared to be tolerant and indulgent towards young people exhibiting various stages of progress in the development of the voice—thrills are not expected and seldom found. The Tuesday evening program was an exception, made especially so by the brilliant singing of Jewel Cantrall.

Mrs. Cantrall has been studying with Mrs. Voyer for several years, and her voice has been enjoyed for its sweetness and flexibility, but "something new has been added" since I last heard her. She has retained her exquisite coloratura quality and has developed a dramatic depth that could put her in the top brackets.

Several of the younger students were appearing as soloists for the first time, but all of them showed promise of becoming accomplished singers, with maturity and study.

Mrs. Jerome Henry, mezzo-soprano, has never appeared to better advantage than in her selection Tuesday evening. Her voice has developed power and smoothness during the past year, and she shows much intelligence in her interpretation.

Another thrill of the evening was the singing of Hilton Kessler, who has a voice of that real tenor quality, which is so rare. Mr. Kessler has studied in Chicago, New York and Philadelphia, and has recently been released from the army after two years of service. He is now coaching with Mrs. Voyer in preparation for a professional debut, for he has what it takes—good appearance, charm, intelligence and an exceptional voice.

The guest artists are well-known to Klamath Falls audiences. Madelon Adler, now only 14, plays with a skill and understanding far beyond her years. So will go as far as she cares to in the artistic world.

Mrs. Lewis Hornby has often been heard in ensemble with Mr. and Mrs. Best. She manages to steal some time for her violin from a hectic day as a young wife and mother. Her performance was most professional and enjoyable.
