BERTHELSDORF NOW HOLDS MAJOR RANK

Time Of Truman's Departure Uncertain

WASHINGTON, June 11 (AP) — The time for President Truman's departure for the west coast is still uncertain, Press Secretary Charles G. Ross said today, since the time for the closing of the United Nations conference in San Francisco is still indefinite.

(The president is expected to visit Governor Wallgren in Olympia, Wash.)

Ross said that George E. Allen, Washington insurance man and presidential confidante left today for San Francisco as Mr. Truman's personal representative to make arrangements for the president's visit.

Housing Units At Vanport Vacant

PORTLAND, June 11 (AP) — There are 2678 vacant housing units in Vanport, but 1000 units are needed in other areas where workers cannot be recruited because of the shortage, the war housing authority said today.

Occupancy rate is 84.5 per cent of the 18,177 units in the Portland vicinity. Director Harry D. Freeman said. He stated the Aluminum Company of America is building a 50-unit trailer camp near Troutdale.

WORLD MONEY PLAN SCORED BY ELLSWORTH

WASHINGTON, June 11 (AP) — The new commercial policy of the United States is a greater threat to American forestry than the effects of war, says Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore.)

"With all its noble phrases in international cooperation and stabilization, the Bretton Woods plan leaves in the hands of each country the most powerful factor in its own trading position, namely the value of its currency in relation to other currencies," Ellsworth said during debate on monetary phases of the international agreement.

And he added: "The effects of war will disappear in a few years of increasing growth from our vast area of forest land. I am much more concerned over the effects on American forestry in the long run of the new commercial policy of the United States."

Ellsworth declared that, at present exchange rate, a Canadian lumberman may bid \$39 per thousand feet to take business from his American rival and still get \$42.90 in Canadian currency, which, in Canada has greater buying power for labor and goods than the American dollar has within the United States.

"If we box the compass of world trade," he said, "we find the same competitive handicap against American goods at almost every point."

Ten or 12 years ago, Ellsworth said, the wood pulp industry of the Pacific Northwest was chopped down to one-third of normal production because of importations of Scandinavian pulp, sold in the United States at around 70 or 80 cents against the American dollar.

"The reciprocal trade policy was launched about 10 years ago, but there has been almost a total lack of reciprocity in its dealings with lumber," he said. "The net effect of the two trade agreements with Canada and one with Great Britain has been to cut the American lumber duty in half and, by generalization, extend the benefit of this reduction to every lumber exporting country in the world."

Lost River Dairy Plant In Medford Sold To Co-Op

MEDFORD, June 11 (AP) — Purchase of the Lost River dairy plant here by the Southwestern Oregon Dairy Cooperative association was announced today. A cheese plant will be added, enabling the association to handle cheese, cream and market milk.

C. A. Smith, Medford, is the new president of the association, succeeding Henry Padgham, who recently resigned.

Klamath Youths Report To Navy

Charles Ramsey and Robert Riggs, both of Klamath Falls, are reporting for active duty as seamen first class with the USNR. They will receive a year of schooling at the Great Lakes naval training center. Upon graduation they will be placed in the fleet as radar men second class.

Among boys reporting to Portland for navy physical examinations June 12 are Jack Leon Lindsay, Lesley Lindberg Shaw, John Paul Foster, Leonard Stanley Humphrey, Benton Dwayne Harrington, all of Klamath Falls.

After the exams they will be returned to their homes on inactive duty awaiting orders to report to the navy training center in San Diego for boot training.

Tax Paying Deadline Slated For August

The next tax paying deadline will be August 15, for the last quarter of 1944-45, according to Mrs. Elsie Siemens, deputy tax collector.

This is the last day that the 1944-45 tax may be paid without interest. It includes real estate and a personal property taxes, she stated.

Snell Calls Meeting On Tourist Travel

SALEM, June 11 (AP) — Governor Earl Snell today called a statewide meeting on tourist development to be held here next Friday, with those in attendance including all persons and organizations interested in promoting tourist travel.

"It is generally recognized," the governor said, "that Oregon is the top ranking recreational and inspirational paradise in the union and that we should capitalize on our great tourist potentialities."

"The tourist industry is an industry, the income from which was estimated at \$50,000,000 a year in normal years. It can easily be doubled. It could and perhaps should be trebled."

Man In Meat Theft To Be Sentenced

Clarence M. Thompson of Malin, who pleaded guilty to two charges of larceny from a warehouse in circuit court Saturday, will be sentenced by Judge David R. Vandenberg Tuesday morning.
