JUSTICE COURT, NOT HIT BY JUDGE

Justice court, rather than management, that drew criticism of Circuit Judge R. Vandenberg Saturday afternoon with the release of a prisoner after one-day's incarceration on a 30-day sentence, according to courthouse reports.

William Hunter, 19, who was only one day of a 30-day jail sentence was released on an order of Justice J. Mahoney upon a motion by Peter H. Rozendal, county officer, Mahoney said to Hunter was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail for carrying concealed weapons. He was arrested by city police Dec. 14, and was sentenced the day after.

He was released for a medical reason, Mahoney stated. Dr. Rozendal said that he needed medical treatment but that he couldn't treat while he was in jail. He was medically discharged from the army and at the time of arrest for carrying concealed weapons he was just 18 old.

Hunter was sentenced to two years in the Oregon state penitentiary Saturday by Circuit Judge R. Vandenberg for receiving money under false pretenses. Hunter had pleaded guilty to the charge.

Conditioning Delayed By Weather

Although summer conditioning roads has been held up by wet weather, and some of the necessary maintenance caused by rains, the Lake of the Woods and Lake are reported passable. About 15 men at the Rocky camp are working on trails and telephone lines. Sarginson of the U. S.
