

CITY BUDGET APPROVED BY COUNCIL MEN

At a meeting of the council last night, the city budget for 1945-46 was submitted by Police Judge Harold Franey for approval of publication. The recommendation of the budget committee was accepted and Franey was authorized to publish the budget in a motion made by Councilman Paul Landry, seconded by Councilman Angus Newton, and unanimously carried.

Bert Hall, chairman of the city board of health, appeared before the council and made a report in connection with the city milk tax. Lost River dairy has not paid this tax on milk delivered to the Marine Barracks, Hall said, which is one-eighth of a cent a gallon on milk and one cent a gallon on cream. Hall explained that this tax was instigated about 10 years ago and that it was on an entirely voluntary basis on the part of the dairies. Hall stated that if one didn't pay the tax, such as the Lost River dairy, the other two, namely Crater Lake dairy and Raymond dairy, should not be required to pay.

Referred
After a lengthy discussion the matter was referred to Henry Perkins, city attorney, and the judiciary committee.

Mayor Ed Ostendorf reported that he had attended a meeting with OPA officials at the chamber of commerce in regard to the Klamath Heating company will be unable to obtain oil for heating purposes and must utilize coal. Orders for this coal must be placed immediately, Ostendorf declared, as it is not available in any abundance.

Dr. Lloyd J. Goble, 322 N. 9th, appeared before the council and requested permission to pave the parking strip in front of his residence. The matter was taken under advisement and referred to the street commission and E. A. Thomas, city engineer.

Matter Referred
George P. Davis appeared before the council as a representative of the Lorenz company, 6th and Broad, and asked the council's approval to lower the sidewalk a maximum of 18 inches in order to install a ramp. This action would remove heavy trucks from the street, Davis argued, and said that the company would build it either on a slope or with steps. He also stated that a permanent light would be installed there if the council so desired. This matter was also referred to the street commission and city engineer.

A report of the electrical inspector and one of the plumbing inspectors were read by Franey and approved by the council.

World Federation Said Peace Requisite

PORTLAND, June 12 (AP)—World federation is a minimum essential for peace rather than an ultimate goal, Dr. Vernon Nash, a director of Federal World Government, Inc., contended before the 11th annual

northwest institute of international relations.

Dr. Nash told the Reed college institute that whenever human groups have become interdependent, and have sharp conflicts of interest, war has been irremediable. The solution has been willingness to set up common government over themselves, he said.

"The distinctive element in federalism is a system providing for an agreed-upon division of responsibilities, with each government remaining supreme in its own sphere," Nash explained yesterday. "It will not be necessary to do more than that to have a lasting peace, and it will be fatal to do less."
