

COMPLETES CENTRALIZED TRAFFIC PLAN

The final 20-mile section of the Western Pacific railroad's centralized traffic control signal system was "cut in" at 11 a. m. today.

With this event the Western Pacific has completed a \$1,450,000 project which was begun in latter part of 1943. This improvement places the 117 miles of Western Pacific's Feather River canyon operations under signal control. Including train yards at Oroville and the installations embracing 121 miles. The signal equipment for the installations furnished by the Union Switch and Signal company of Schuylkill, Pa.

Under this system the movement of all trains in the Feather River canyon will be directed by a dispatcher in a tower located at Keddie, which is 78 miles east of Oroville. Trains are directed by signal indicators only, thus eliminating the use of written train orders. Switches to passing tracks are controlled and closed by remote control by the dispatcher at Keddie.

MARINES TO JOIN PORTLAND PARADE

War Vets Needed In Various Jobs, Report

PORTLAND, June 12 (AP)—A large number of jobs in various government agencies in Oregon are open to war veterans, Thomas W. Craig, assistant regional director of the United States civil service commission, said today.

Particularly needed are engineering aides and draftsmen, \$1,070 to \$2,708 per year; civil engineers, \$3,183 to \$4,428 and a large number of painters, plumbers, aircraft mechanics, hospital attendants and auto mechanics. Skilled craftsmen are being recruited for west coast navy yards and Pearl Harbor.

DEER 'KIDNAPPERS' WARNED BY POLICE

"Kidnappers" of fawns were warned today by state police that anyone found with a young deer in their possession will be subject to arrest. Authorities reported that several parties have come to them bearing newborn fawns "about the size of a jack-rabbit," and warnings were deemed necessary in connection with these baby-snatchers.

With the advent of spring, the forests are full of fawns whose mothers leave them to fend for themselves when anyone approaches. Instinct has taught the "youngsters" to keep themselves hidden to avoid detection, while mama locates herself in some nearby convenient thicket. The sight of a forsaken fawn appeals to the individual, who immediately picks them up with the idea of keeping them as a pet.

Everyone is urged to leave them entirely alone, because once a human being, a doe often refuses to return to her offspring.

Portland Not Yet 'Port-Minded'

PORTLAND, June 12 (AP)—Portland has yet to become "port-minded," Mayor Earl Riley told a meeting of officials who offered suggestions for making the city a primary Pacific coast port.

Riley asked for co-operation of business, industry and agriculture in expanding trade with the Orient, South American and other Pacific coast ports. Suggestions included a home-owned and operated turn-around ship line, better terminals and channel-harbor facilities.

WASHINGTON, June 12 (AP)—The White House disclosed today the resignation of Edward D. McKim, President Truman's chief administrative assistant, to become a deputy federal loan administrator.

Press Secretary Charles G. Ross told his news conference he did not know who would replace McKim in his job as \$10,000-a-year chief administrative assistant, nor what McKim's salary would be in his new post.

McKim, one of the men who accompanied the president when he campaigned for the vice presidency last fall, is on leave from his post as an executive of an insurance company at Omaha.
