62 CITIZENS JOIN 'LIMIT' CLUB IN CITY

Sixty-two Klamath citizens now belong to the 7th War Loan "limit club" and altogether have purchased \$310,000 in E bonds in the current campaign.

The county war finance committee hopes that 100 will eventually make up the membership of the "limit club" which is open to citizens who buy \$5000 in E bonds, the statutory limit on one individual's purchase in a year.

Klamath was the first county to start a limit club in the war bond campaign, and since the project was inaugurated here a number of other counties have written for details.
