1945 Schedule Calls For Minimum Amount Of Traveling By Grid Teams

SPOKANE, Wash., June 13 (AP)—A Pacific coast conference football schedule covering all conference teams except Stanford and Montana, was adopted last night by conference officials meeting here.

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Tigers Regain 1st Place

Detroit Noses Out Browns, 2-1, in 11 Innings While Senators Trip Yanks, 5-3

Shed a tear for fat Freddy Fitzsimmons whose futile Phillies are rushing madly toward an early clinching of the 1945 cellar championship with their usual fervor by losing 15 in a row.

Not since 1932 when Burt Shotton led them to the giddy heights of fourth place have the Phils failed to finish either seventh or eighth and seven times it was last. Managers came and went but Jimmy Wilson, Doc Prothro, Hans Lobert, Bucky Harris and Fitz saw nothing but the cold grey walls of the National league dungeon with an occasional next-to-last-place reprieve. They remain the one consistent team in wartime baseball.

It used to be the cash that was lacking and the club was operated with an idea of selling the choice players to opposing teams to balance the budget. That difficulty was removed when Bob Carpenter bought the club. Now the Phils have plenty of dollar bills but can't get the talent.

Boston hung No. 13 on Fitz and his groggy crew yesterday, 10-0, for the Braves' eighth successive win, five of which have been over their old cell mates. New blood and new money are producing in the hub to push the Braves up into the race only 3 1/2 games back of New York. Johnny Hutchings did the job on the Phils, a four-hitter.

At the rate the Giants are tumbling, only an extended series with the Phillies will save their lead. Losing seven of their last eight since the incident of the \$500 pitch by Bill Voiselle in St. Louis, the New Yorkers have even their lead pared to a single game. Yesterday's 7-4 drubbing by Brooklyn ended the last victory streak they were nursing. Van Mungo's six straight pitching wins. Vic Lombardi limited the leaders to seven hits to beat them for the second time.

Bucs Whip Cubs
Pittsburgh's night triumph over Chicago, 9-3, boosted the Buccos up to within one length of the Giants as Al Gerberauer, a refugee from the Phils, showed his relief by contributing four singles to the Pirates' attack in addition to throwing a nine-hitter at the Cubs.

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Camilli Out As Manager Of Acorns

Billy Raimondi Replaces Camilli As Oakland Pilot; Beavers Meet Suds Tonight

Oakland, with a new skipper at the helm, was back in third place in the Pacific Coast Baseball league today, aided by Sacramento's loss to San Diego.

Big news in the circuit yesterday was the replacement of Dolph Camilli by Billy Raimondi, veteran catcher, as manager of the Acorns. Conflicting statements marked the shakeup.

Camilli said he was "fired"; the front office announced he had resigned; but it was common knowledge through the league that the club's owners were dissatisfied with the former big-league star's failure to play first base oftener instead of directing his team from the bench.

Oaks Edge Seals
Under 32-year-old Raimondi, who has been with the Oaks for 12 years the East-Bay club edged out San Francisco 3-2 last night. Neither team scored until the sixth frame when the Acorns got to righthander Frankie Seward for two runs, and pushed their other tally across in the seventh against relief hurler Tony Buzolich. The Seals were blanked by Garth Mann until the eighth when singles by Berni Uhalt and Roy Nicely, followed by Gus Suhr's double, accounted for the losers' two runs.

Padres Drop Solons
Sacramento's 5-4 loss to San Diego dropped the Solons into fourth, a half game behind the Oaks. The Padres got off to a 5-0 lead in the first two innings, driving Pitcher Giles Knowles to the showers in the second frame. The Solons came back to count one apiece in the fourth and fifth stanzas and almost knotted the score in the last of the ninth after Pinch-Hitter Roy Younkens had punched out a two-run double. Younkens was called out at the plate in the last play of the game as he tried to score the tying run on Lillo Marcucci's two-bagger. Valie Eaves, leading San Diego moundsman, got credit for the win although he was relieved at the end of the fifth inning.

With the season nearly third gone the batting lineups, with a second division half average of .240, the New York Yankees and four other half games ahead of fourth place Boston, which boasts a swat mark bordering on 200.

The reason? It's pitching which shows that Detroit has exactly half of its 20 victories by one-run margins.
