Practically everything is short, they said—red points, meats, fowl, fish, butter and sugar. They look unhappily toward July and August, when the OPA will allot them 20 per cent less meat and cooking fats than in May and June.

Restaurant men pointed out also that they cannot get such items as hearts, tongue, ox-tails and pot roasts. As a result they claim they must use their points for high-point meat.

The proprietors even see the gloomy side of a holiday. Points are allotted on the basis of customers served in the preceding two months, so those that close will get fewer points when they reopen.

## DECREASE IN LAKE COUNTY FARMS SEEN

The number of farms in Lake county, Oregon, as shown by the preliminary count of returns of the 1945 census of agriculture was 432, as compared with 484 in 1940, and 513 in 1935. This was announced today by R. L. Ackerman, supervisor for the 1945 farm census in the third Oregon census district with headquarters at Klamath Falls.

The total land in farms in Lake county, according to the preliminary 1945 census count, was 1,104,033 acres, as compared with 863,205 acres in 1940, and 729,810 acres in 1935. Average size of farms shown in the preliminary 1945 census count for Lake county was 2556 acres, as compared with 1783 acres in 1940, and 1423 acres in 1935.

In announcing the 1945 census totals of farms and land in farms in Lake county, Supervisor Ackerman pointed out that the figures are preliminary and subject to correction. Final tabulations of Lake county farm census returns will be made by the Bureau of the Census and announced from Washington when completed, Mr. Ackerman said.

## Farm-Minded Vets Urged To Contact County Agent

Veterans interested in purchasing farms are urged to contact the county agriculture agent. The agriculture department has set up a program to help veterans determine where to farm, how to get started in farming, what it costs to get started, how to get money to buy equipment and operate a farm, and how much money one is likely to make in farming.

All veterans and their dependents, both in Klamath Falls and in surrounding territory are invited to take their problems to Patrick W. Kilby, veterans administration contact officer.

The contact office is in the basement of Klamath county courthouse, and questions phoned, written or brought in person will be given the utmost consideration. The telephone number of the office is 7188.

Service rendered by the veterans administration is given free of charge.

Veterans of World War 2, interested in obtaining a loan under the G. I. bill for farms, homes and business are advised to contact this office for an explanation of the law, and determination of eligibility before contacting a lending agency.

Dependents of deceased service personnel may contact this office when making application for insurance benefits, pension, and gratuity pay. Discharged servicemen are advised to continue to pay premiums of government and national life insurance after discharge within the time designated on the discharge certificates unless absolutely sure they wish to discontinue carrying the insurance.

Any information regarding payment of premiums, conversion, and waiver of premiums can be obtained from the local office.

Sift flour, measure, and sift again with corn meal, baking powder, soda, sugar, and salt. Beat egg yolks, add milk and combine with dry ingredients, beating until smooth. Add melted butter or margarine and fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Drop by tablespoonfuls on moderately hot, lightly-greased griddle or heavy frying pan. Turn cakes when bubbles form on top surface. Bake until golden brown. Serve with equal amounts of melted butter or margarine and heated syrup. Makes 10 to 12 medium-size cakes.

**DUMPLING QUICKIE**  
2 cups biscuit mix 1 cup milk  
Place mix in bowl; add milk all at once; stir only until all of the flour is dampened. Drop dumplings by tablespoonfuls on gently boiling stew or liquid in large kettle with tight-fitting cover; cover; steam 15 minutes or until done, without removing cover. Makes 12 medium-size dumplings.
