QUEEN NAMED IN WRA BOND SALE CONTEST

NEWELL, Calif. — The appointed personnel at the Tulare segregation center, meeting on Saturday afternoon and evening, will engage in the finale of the western war bond jamboree which is being presented in connection with the 7th War Loan drive.

For more than two weeks, the WRA staff has been voting, by purchase of war bonds, for the election of a queen, naming Gloria Giorgis to be crowned on Saturday night. Bonds purchased by the staff in the queen contest amounted to approximately \$17,000, maturity value.

The staff is also engaging in a whiskey growing, as well as a western costume contest. Saturday's activities will be given in a large western corral which was dedicated to the 7th War Loan, and will include entertainment features, auctions, games and a kangaroo court, with all items involving the purchase of bonds or stamps. All items to be auctioned which have been contributed by the staff members, will be delivered to the bidders along with the bonds or stamps purchased.

Dancing may also be enjoyed to music furnished by the men from Camp Tulelake. The WRA has announced that visitors desiring to witness or participate in the festivities will be welcome, and they will be admitted at the military gate without preliminary arrangement.

On the evening of V-E Day in Europe, the WRA staff enjoyed a celebration at the personnel recreation club, at which time \$7300 in war bonds was purchased. This was in addition to all purchases which had been made since the beginning of the 7th War Loan drive.

GRESHAM, June 14 (AP)—DDT, the new insecticide, was used on certified seed potatoes here, and County Agent S. B. Hall said the result was more mosaic disease than before.

JURY FINDS FOR DEFENDANT HERE

A jury found in favor of the defendant yesterday in circuit court in the damage suit filed by Beale Greenmeyer against Lee Samuel Palmer and John Bonham. The plaintiff had asked \$10,116 for hospital bills, doctor bills, and injuries to person and an additional \$600 for destruction of her automobile. J. C. O'Neill was attorney for the plaintiff and R. E. Maxwell represented the defendants.

The plaintiff and defendants were assertedly involved in a head-on automobile collision in front of the Roosevelt tavern Nov. 2, 1944. Mrs. Greenmeyer claimed she received four broken ribs, leg, chest and head injuries, and that her car was completely destroyed. She also claimed that the leg and chest injuries permanently disabled her.

The case against Bonham was dismissed upon a motion by Maxwell on the grounds that Bonham was not operating the automobile involved in the accident. The jury later returned a verdict in favor of Palmer, the other defendant. Circuit Court Judge David R. Vandenberg heard the case.

WEED CONDITIONS DAMAGE ONIONS

TULELAKE—Weed conditions are serious in onion fields in the south end of the Klamath basin. It was reported today after a check by Chet Main, president of the Tulelake Growers. He said one six-acre field was taken entirely by weeds.

Weeding operations are being pushed, however, and are now about half finished. Potato planting is complete. Main said. Extent of losses from rains and frosts is not known yet, he said, but it appears the yield will be somewhat smaller than last year.
