other war industries in Osaka and neighboring Amaga Aki. The strike of Japan's greatest industrial city was made by 520 Superforts on the first anniversary of their initial raid on Nippon. Clouds obscured results, but Tokyo admitted fires were started in widely separated sections.

From Okinawa, Associated Press War Correspondent Al Dopping reported that "all along the front there were unmistakable signs that the Japanese will to fight was broken."

Maj. Gen. Pedro Del Valle, commander of the first marine division attacking the west flank, said the Japanese might be crushed "in two days or two weeks—it all depends on how lucky we are."

Many Surrender
Hundreds surrendered. Scores killed themselves. Others were shot in the back by their comrades as they tried to give up.

Three American divisions closed in on the enemy's southern mountain fortress, led by the 96th division which captured Yaeju hill, highest point on the escarpment, and drove toward the second highest peak. Yaeju is in the center of the northern front. A mile and a half to the southeast the seventh infantry made advances of up to 700 yards, driving into Nakaza town.

On the western flank the first marines widened their hold on Kunishi ridge in a pre-dawn attack and fought off a series of daytime counterattacks. The devil dogs were under continuous heavy fire.

Most surrenders and suicides were reported on this front and on the west coast's Oroku peninsula, where sixth division marines were mopping up.

Youth Killed By 'Unloaded' Gun

CANBY—Ray Pingel, 17, was fatally wounded here Wednesday, June 13, while at a friend's home. The friend, John Alexander, about the same age, was showing Pingel one of his father's guns, which he thought was unloaded. Pingel, seated and reading a comic book, received two shots through the neck.

Both boys, frightened, ran across the highway to the White Cabin, where the owner, John Buckley, rushed Pingel to the hospital in Alturas. He died an hour and a half later.

Besides his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Pingel of Canby, two brothers and two sisters survive him.

one of the big nations to be able to veto the change. If they can't have these things, they say, they want the right to pull out—a right which could be used as a club against the big powers.

No Time Limit
The Big five admit that possibly the charter may have to be amended some day, but they argue that no time limit should be fixed. A limit, they contend, might compel calling a conference on charter revision just when the league is meeting its severest test.

The conference, leadership is shooting for a settlement of these and related issues this week. A full schedule of both open commission meetings and closed committee sessions has been set up for the next few days.

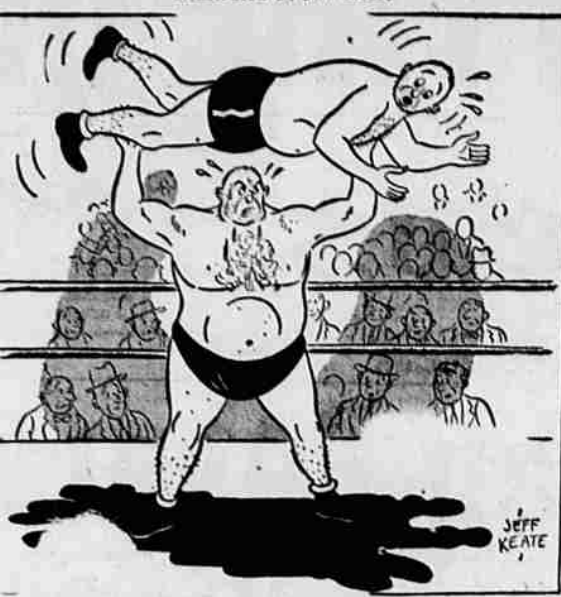
