

PROMOTERS OF TOURIST TRADE MEET IN SALEM

SALEM, June 15 (AP)—Eighty representatives of chamber of commerce, advertising clubs, hotels, air lines, oil companies, hotel and tourist park associations, meeting here today called on Governor Earl to map a plan for promotion of Oregon's tourist business in the immediate postwar years, that they already have in the bank for one form of advertising.

W. R. May, Oregon publisher, notified the committee raised by a group of Oregon businessmen in 1941 for continuation of the Frank Branch Riley lecture tours were to be available for use. May did not say what money had been collected, but he said it was "substantial."

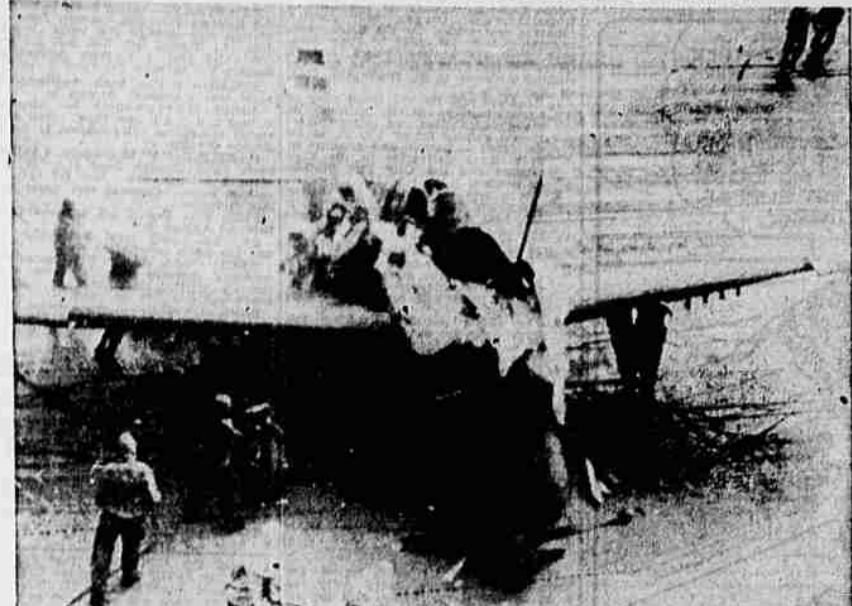

Tulelake

Opening of the Tulelake Growers' migratory labor camp is being held up until beds ordered from Seattle arrive, it is announced by Chester Main, president of the Growers'.

Mr. and Mrs. Irving Capek left Tuesday night to fish in Diamond lake for a day or two. Capek is manager of a local gas station.

Believed to be the first Nisei casualty from the Tulelake center in the Okinawa campaign is T-4 Mituru Shibata, who was killed April 23, according to word received from the war department by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Kakuchi Shibata.

The farm section of the Tulelake Japanese compound has harvested 24,570 pounds of spring vegetables and this week has completed seeding a large portion of the 1300 acres being used by the camp this year. 23,520 pounds of green onions and 1050 pounds of radishes have been pulled.

Other crops planted include 150 acres of potatoes, 22 onions, 16 radishes, 12 gobs and 10 of moppa.

The livestock unit produced and delivered 41,285 pounds of dressed pork, 4178 pounds of sausage and 10,030 of lard to the mess operations.

Five hundred fifty-seven hogs were bought during May, bringing the total number on hand to 1362.
