ROADS INTO PARK PARTIALLY OPENED

Roads into Crater Lake National park are open now as far as headquarters, Thomas C. Parker, assistant park superintendent, stated.

Parker, who has been making frequent trips to the park this week, took up a crew of men Thursday to open and renovate headquarters buildings, connect lights and prepare things for the summer.

From park headquarters, Parker said, rugged individuals might hike the distance to the crater's rim, approximately two miles, over deep, solid snow. Road clearing to the rim will not be started until plows and equipment are through clearing service roads around headquarters buildings.

Minimum Car Loading Upped For Spuds by ODT

WASHINGTON, June 16 (AP)—The ODT today announced an increase in minimum railroad car loading requirements for early potatoes.

The minimum last year was 30,000 pounds a car. This year it will be 40,000 pounds for shipments from California and 36,000 pounds in eastern and southern states.

The increases were ordered, ODT explained, to insure movement of a bumper crop of early potatoes and to conserve the limited supply of refrigerator cars.

CHILOQUIN MAN HELD ON CHARGE

Silas Barkley of Chiloquin was indicted yesterday by the federal grand jury at Portland on a charge of forging a government check here, it was learned today.

Barkley allegedly stole government checks and forged the endorsement, according to reports from the sheriff's office here. He is held in the Multnomah county jail at present.

Barkley has a long criminal record. He served two prison terms in the Oregon state penitentiary for crimes committed in Klamath county, Deputy Sheriff Dale Mattoon said today.

One was for robbery and the other for burglary of the Pelican Grill where he stole an Oriental tapestry valued at \$1000.

Prior to this he had served a term at McNeil island, Wash., on a federal charge, Mattoon said.

The federal grand jury returned a not true bill on Roy Wilson, Klamath Indian, who was charged with assault.

Weyerhaeuser Worker Charged With Forgery

Albert Merton Waldo, employee of Weyerhaeuser Timber company, was arraigned in justice court Friday charged with forgery of endorsement on a check.

He waived preliminary hearing and bail was set at \$1000 cash. He was committed to the county jail in lieu of bail.

Waldo is alleged to have found an envelope containing a check and to have cashed the check by forging the endorsement. He was arrested on a warrant from the sheriff's office.

Yugoslavs Schedule General Elections

MOSCOW, June 16 (AP)—A dispatch to Red Star said today that general elections had been ordered for Yugoslavia with women voting for the first time and all soldiers, regardless of age, casting ballots. This will include many teen-age partisans.

It was also announced that the war had cost Yugoslavia 1,700,000 of its pre-war population of 15,000,000 persons.
