It was reported that during the month of May, the seven Nurse's Aides got in 128 hours of work. They deserve more than a great deal of credit for the marvelous job they have performed, because most of the women are married, and are sacrificing much in order to do this work—many are giving more than the necessary 150 hours of volunteer work that is required yearly.

Applicants must be a citizen of the United States, a high school graduate or its equivalent and be in good health.
