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within the sphere of action of the United Nations or relations to the powers and functions of any of its organs or other bodies within the scope of the charter, and make recommendations to the members of the United Nations or to the security council, or both, on any such questions or matters."

This proposal was laid before the conference's policy-shaping committee and steering committee today. Secretary of State Stettinius announced that Big Three delegation chiefs were meeting hurriedly to consider it, and that it also was being discussed before the conference technical committee handling political and security functions of the assembly.

It was reported reliably that the first soviet reaction was favorable. Asked whether the soviet proposal met with approval of soviet delegation chief, Andrei Gromyko, Stettinius replied: "I can't say

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that a list of witnesses be filed, including an unspecified officer of the British military mission in Moscow.

The Poles sat immobile through the lengthy reading of charges, which included allegations of conspiracies entered in by the general staff of the Polish London government against the Russian army.

Each of the Polish defendants marched into the chamber accompanied by a red army guard.

Defends Self

Orlowski announced he would defend himself. Seven soviet officers were seated before the box, available for use if needed.

The charges alleged that resident Sosnokowski of Poland's London regime and Okulski agreed that weapons, print shops, radio stations and ammunition should be preserved for fighting the red army. The charges said the group of accused Poles carried on consistent anti-soviet and anti-red activities.

Coasts Swelter In Heat Wave

The nation's eastern and western coasts shared a weekend roasting, sweltering in a pre-summer heat wave as southern and midwestern states enjoyed milder temperatures but were harassed by thunderstorms and a threat of flood damage.

Thirty-nine deaths were attributed directly and indirectly to the heat. Thirty-two drownings were reported, and seven heat deaths. The Philadelphia area total of 15 deaths, nine from drowning and six from the heat, was the highest.

GIRL INJURED IN BIKE ACCIDENT

Barbara Searles, 10-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Searles, 22 Lytton, is in the Klamath Valley hospital with severe injuries to her face and throat as a result of an accident on her bicycle.

The accident occurred Saturday evening when, according to reports received at the police station, brakes on her bicycle didn't hold and she ran into a car driven by J. T. Totten, 1436 Crescent. The bicycle struck the car at the intersection of Oregon and Blehn.

Totten examined the child and walked with her to her home. At the time it didn't seem that she was injured badly, although her nose was bruised. When Searles returned home he took Barbara to Klamath Valley hospital where she was examined by Dr. George H. Adler, who found her nose was broken and small bones in her mouth and throat were fractured. Stitches were taken in her nose.

The hospital reported Monday that Barbara's condition was somewhat improved although full extent of injuries were not determined yet, and x-rays were being taken.

As a result of the accident, Acting Chief of Police Orville Hamilton has issued a warning to parents to keep children from playing on the streets with their bicycles.

Crawford Trial Set For Monday

The trial of Merl M. Crawford, Klamath Indian charged with raping a 60-year-old Mills addition white woman, was continued until Monday, June 25, at 10 a. m. this morning by Circuit Court Judge David R. Vandenberg because of lack of jurors. Of a total panel of 31, fifteen were excused, six were not found, seven were named to the grand jury, and three were held over. George Roberts of Medford, attorney for the defense, and District Attorney Clarence A. Humble agreed to the continuance.

Judge Vandenberg issued an order for 21 veniremen to be drawn to fill the regular panel and an additional 15 prospective jurors to be drawn by special venire. They will be due to appear in circuit court next Monday morning when the Crawford trial is scheduled to open.
