

PROGRAM FOR IMPROVEMENT OF CITY EYED

TULELAKE—A city improvement program took shape at last night's council meeting, with extension of the sewage system, street lights, curbs, gutters and sidewalks proposed for early action.

merely hoped to escape with their own precious lives and sneak back later to dig up the gold for their OWN uses.

PRESIDENT TRUMAN today recommends to congress legislation making the speaker of the house of representatives next in succession to the Presidency as it now stands the secretary of state would become President if Truman should die.

He points out that he now could APPOINT his successor (in the event, that is, that he should die in office). We would then have an appointed, not an elected, President. In order to become speaker, a member of the house must first be ELECTED.

The same is true of members of the senate, but President Truman points out that members of the house of representatives are closer to the people than senators.

The dispatches point out with the brutal candor of good reporters that since President Truman is embarking on an unprecedented period of travel by air to San Francisco, via Olympia, to address the UNCTO conference, back to Washington, then to Berlin to attend the meeting of the Big Three) the chances of his death while in office are not necessarily remote.

(IN addition to the considerations mentioned, there is the further fact that Mr. Stettinius, present secretary of state and thus next in line of succession, is a Republican.)

Under examination by the prosecutor and president of the court, he said Sosnkowski had told him Russia threatened Poland's independence and that the home army "should go underground to help preserve Poland's independence."

Okulicki testified that he was appointed "commander of the east and west," including areas occupied by the Russian army. He maintained that he took no part in killings, train wrecking or executions nor gave any orders for them, but added: "As commander of the underground army, I am responsible."

by-laws restrain trade and therefore violate the Sherman anti-trust act.

The decision came near the close of a daylong session winding up the court term. The court recessed until October 1. The action backed up in full the 2 to 1 summary judgment of a special district court in New York that the AP membership laws must be amended to prevent AP members from considering the competitive ability of an applicant for membership.

The decision, however, as did the lower court ruling, permits the AP to place other restrictions on membership and leaves in effect, providing the membership rules are changed, other by-laws attacked by the government.

These cover an exclusive news exchange with the Canadian press; permit the AP to limit its news exclusively to AP members and to require members to furnish local news solely to the AP.


