Tigers Rap Tribe, 4-3; Yanks Lose

Three Castoff Pitchers Turn In Gilt-Edged Mound Efforts To Blank Rivals

A trio of castoff pitchers demonstrated last night they might have an important bearing on the American and National league pennant races.

The three, Roger Wolf of Washington, Clem Hausmann of the Boston Red Sox and Joe Bowman of Cincinnati, each turned in a gilt-edged mound effort to blank their opposition in 31 innings.

Wolf, the 32-year-old veteran, who reached the majors via Philadelphia at the advanced age of 29, and was traded to the Senators at the end of the 1943 season, held his former teammates to one hit in the opener to help the Nats win a doubleheader from the Athletics 6-0 and 5-3.

Hurles One-Hitter
Only 28 men faced the knuckleball expert. Hal Peck's fourth inning double ruined his quest for a no-hitter. The triumph was Wolf's seventh against three defeats. In each of his losses he gave up but one run.

Clem Hausmann, 25-year-old righthander, whom the New York Yankees thought so little of when he pitched for their Kansas City farm two years ago, that they allowed the Red Sox to draft him, turned on his former employers and white-washed the Yankees with three hits to eke out a 1-0 decision.

The victory, Hausmann's second straight 1-0 three-hitter, and his fourth in a row, put the third place Boston only half a game behind the Yankees, who dropped to two games behind the league leading Detroit Tigers. Hank Borowy was the victim.

Bowman, 35-year-old veteran who has seen service with six clubs, and only a month ago was obtained on waivers from the Red Sox, turned in his fourth win without a defeat for the Reds with a brilliant 13-inning 1-0 triumph over the World Champion St. Louis Cardinals.

After battling on even terms with Charley Barrett of the Redbirds for 12 scoreless innings, Catcher Al Unser, another American league castoff, via the Tigers, singled home Al Libke from second for the winning run.

Detroit Whips Tribe
Detroit increased its first place American league lead a full game over the Yankees by whipping Cleveland 4-3 in a twilight tilt before 20,351 fans.

Frank Overmire, third Detroit hurler, took over in the ninth to give the decision for Starter Zeb Eaton.

With General of the Army Dwight Eisenhower looking on, the New York Giants continued their downward slide losing to Boston, 9-2, as Jim Tobin held them to eight hits. The defeat, their fourth straight and 18th in their last 23 starts dropped them to three percentage points above the second division. It also tightened the National league race to such an extent that sixth place Boston is only three games behind second place Pittsburgh and four and a half behind first place Brooklyn.

Chisox Top Brownies
In the only other major league contest, Chicago's White Sox defeated St. Louis' Browns 5-4, scoring four runs in the seventh aided by Vern Stephens' two errors. Nelson Potter was charged with his fifth straight loss while former Brownie Earl Caldwell gained the decision.

Brooklyn and the Phillies were rained out while Pittsburgh and Chicago were not scheduled.

NEW YORK, June 20 (AP)—Fritzie Zivic arrived today from Pittsburgh to finish training for his 10-round fight against Harold Green at Madison Square Garden Friday night.

Weyerhaeuser Will Clash With Reames

A total of 72 divot diggers will participate in the clambake with 36 on each side. Sacramento Shuts Out Bevos, 2-0

Fletcher Sets Down Bevos With Seven Hits; Seattle Blanks Padres; Gain Game

Echoes of Pacific Coast league battling thunder were to be heard today—the big stick wielders were muffled by three shut-outs last night.

Portland's Beavers, blanked 2-0 by Sacramento, saw a full game melt from their league lead as the second-place Seattle Rainiers won 5-0 from the San Diego Padres. Hollywood's 8-0 decision over San Francisco dropped the Seals out of the first division into a tie for fifth.

Los Angeles, scheduled to open its series against Oakland in a twin bill this afternoon, benefitted by San Francisco's defeat, moving from the sixth place berth it had shared with Sacramento to the fifth rung tie with the Seals.

Fletcher Sets Down Bevos
The Beavers, now three and a half games ahead of the pack, were set down by the Sacramento Solons' ace hurler, Guy Fletcher, with seven scattered hits. Jo-Jo White saved the day for the California Capital City club with a sensational catch of Frank Demaree's eighth-inning line drive against the felt field wall. Two Portland runners were on base and would have scored to knot the count if the clout had gone for a hit. George (Jug) Mandish, Solon right fielder, got four of his club's 11 blows, hitting safely every trip to the plate. Sacramento's victory put it in a tie for third with Oakland.

Rainiers Top Padres
Farmer Hal Turpin, star of the Seattle pitching staff, turned in the best performance of the night as he held the Padres to two stinky singles, allowing only one man to get as far as second base. Meanwhile his mates got to Carl Dumler for five runs, four of which were earned.

Hollywood's rising stars rang down the curtain on Seal Pitcher Knowles Piercey's 1945 career in the Coast league with their eight-run attack. Piercey had been ticketed to be sent to the Birmingham, Ala., club but the San Francisco owners relented and gave the port-sider a chance to redeem himself. He held the Twinks scoreless for the first three innings but weakened in the fourth to allow seven runs on a combination of six hits and two errors. The inning spelled 'finis' to Piercey's tenure with the Seals, who were unable to manufacture any tallies off the slants of Newt Kimball.

Stars Get Tough
The Stars, although still firmly lodged in the cellar, have been playing better than .500 ball since early in May and no longer constitute the "soft touch" they were earlier in the season. They tackle the Seals in a doubleheader tonight to make up a game postponed because of rain the last time they were in San Francisco.

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War Bond Golf Open At Mobile Attracts Pros

MOBILE, Ala., June 20 (AP)—Mobile's \$10,000 war bond open December 13-14 will be a new attraction on the golf pros' winter circuit this year.

The junior chamber of commerce, which is sponsoring the event, received confirmation yesterday from PGA President Ed Dudley that Mobile had been added to the tour.

The circuit will open in Miami, Fla., this year instead of the west coast, will move to Jacksonville, then to Mobile for the third stop.

Speculation Mounts High On SA Derby

ARCADIA, Calif., June 20 (AP) Speculation on Saturday's \$50,000 Santa Anita Derby mounted today with the expected arrival of Ace Jockey George Woolf, the fast workout by the probable favorite Busher, and the impressive victory of Man o' Glory in a prep race.

Woolf, the veteran "iceman" who has ridden seven winners in 13 starts at Santa Anita this meeting, is returning from several weeks' engagements in the east to ride either Sea Sovereign, the strong Charles S. Howard contender, or J. K. Housley's Bymeabout. The choice will not be known until Woolf's arrival tomorrow.

Whichever horse he rides will almost automatically gain as a threat to the swift filly, Busher, who romped through her final stiff drill at the derby distance of a mile and one-eighth yesterday in 1:54 3/8. The Chestnut Lady, undefeated in 1945, definitely rates as the horse to beat, particularly with meet-leading Johnny Longden up.

San Diego Man Will Manage Playfair

SPOKANE, June 20 (AP)—Joe Walters, San Diego, well-known race track official and formerly racing secretary at Playfair track, will return to Spokane this fall as general manager of the local plant, officials of the Spokane Racing and Fair association announced today.

Association officials said Walters turned down only Sunday a similar position with Bing Crosby's track at Del Mar, Calif.

Walters first came to the northwest as assistant racing secretary at Longacres, near Seattle.

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Suggs Will Face Test In Tourney

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., June 20 (AP)—The most obvious fact about the 16th annual Women's Open golf tournament swinging play today was that co-medalist Louise Suggs was enroute to who failed or one of the most deserving champions in WWGA history.

The 21-year-old slugger from Little Springs, Ga., yesterday had the toughest time of any of the top favorites, but she won her first round match from Marge Row, of Annapolis, Md. 2 and 1. Today she opposed Dorothy Germain, the 1944 runner-up, but the match, rated as the standout of the second round, was just another game of golf on the rigorous round to the title for Miss Suggs.

Should Louise succeed in upsetting the Philadelphia veteran, she would move on to a date with the winner of a match between Betty Hicks and Mrs. Mettys Minis White, of Dallas, Texas. The survivor of that match should present a sizable opponent. Miss Hicks is the reigning queen of the national amateur, and Mrs. White is one of the south's best.

Miss Germain, an inconspicuous qualifier at 83, flashed her accustomed form yesterday as she defeated Virginia Barlock of Park Ridge, Ill., 6 and 4. Miss Hicks kept pace by ousting Mrs. Lawrence Seiz, of Highland Park, Ill., the 1932 champion, 4 and 4, and Mrs. White tripped Polly Ann Riley, fellow Texas from Fort Worth, 2 and 1.
