ERDMANN NAMED EUGENE DIRECTOR

LeRoy Erdmann, who has been vocational director of the Klamath Union high school vocational department, leaves for Eugene to take the position of director of the Eugene vocational department in the state excluding Portland.

Erdmann was supervisor of industrial arts during 1941-42 at Fremont grade school, which is now Fremont junior high. In 1943 he assumed the assistant directorship in trades and industries at the high school and became director in 1944.

In Eugene he replaces Dale Perry, director for the past three years. No replacement for Erdmann has yet been named, according to Arnold Gralapp, superintendent of city schools.

DAIRY PRODUCTS SAID ECONOMICAL

Dollar for dollar and point for point dairy products are still the most economical food values offered to the consumer, Lee Holliday, Klamath Falls, said in a mid-June statement in behalf of the Oregon Dairymen's association, of which he is president. The statement was sent to E. L. Peterson, state director of agriculture, in response to an earlier request by the director that all Oregon dairy groups make fitting observance of June as national dairy month.

Holliday urges consumers, as they continue to find certain manufactured dairy products difficult to obtain with the available ration points, to understand that the reason for shortages is on account of increased wartime demand and not because total production of milk has decreased.

Director Peterson says that in 1944 Oregon's milk production reached 1,463,000,000 pounds or the high average per cow of 5540 pounds or 60 pounds of milk per cow more than in the year previous.
