Angstead Takes Over Grid Reins

Paul Angstead, newly named football coach of Klamath Union high school, is a right nice guy. All the kids that we have watched him coach are prepared to give everything they've got to win a ball game for him, and that's half the battle to our way of thinking.

Paul attended Lakeview grade schools and high school. He played on the basketball and baseball teams there for four years—from his freshman year through his senior year. When we asked Paul about his past record, he was inclined to be reticent and said, "Aw, it's just a small school." But small or large, four years of varsity competition speaks for itself.

He attended the University of Oregon from 1925 to 1929. At Oregon he was on the mile relay team in varsity track during his junior year, but dropped it in his senior year because of lack of time.

After leaving Eugene, he took a dual job as science teacher and athletic coach at Gold Hill, Ore. He stayed there until 1932 when he accepted a post as principal of Paisley high school. After that he was recreational and educational instructor in connection with the CCC program for a while and he then came to Klamath Falls in 1937.

For five years he served as supervisor of elementary physical education in the grade schools here and in 1939 he was made principal of Fremont junior high school. He was there two years and coached the Fremont athletic teams to numerous city championships.

While coaching at Fremont he instructed many of the boys who may form the nucleus of the 1945-46 edition of the Pelicans including Tommy Edwards, Bob Redkey, Bob Coleman, and many others. We think that this background will be of great value to both Paul and the boys when the grid season rolls around again this fall.

Last year he was assistant principal of KUHS and coached the Wildcats in basketball and football. His cage team won 16 games while losing one and the Wildcat grid squad annexed six triumphs and absorbed one defeat.

There is no doubt that Paul has his work cut out for him this fall. The Pelican schedule includes Grant of Portland, Salem, Ashland, Grants Pass, Medford, Eugene, Eugene and Bend. It's going to be a big job any way you look at it, but we're sure, and what's more important, the kids are sure, that Paul can turn the trick.

Klamath Falls sport fans don't demand any miracle teams. They do want a team that will fight all the way. And brother, that's what you'll get this fall!

We think the most notable example of the way Paul deals with the kids occurred during a Wildcat basketball game last season. One of his boys made a bucket for the wrong team, becoming confused when the two fives changed baskets at the beginning of the second half. Paul took the boy out who was almost in tears over his mistake. He called the lad up beside him on the bench, put his arm around his shoulders, and laughingly told him, "Why, don't worry about a little thing like that, I've done it myself." A few minutes later when the lad went back in the game he was confident and had forgotten his mistake. Consequently, he played himself a whale of a ball game.

Yes, sir, we think Paul Angstead will do all right on the grid-iron when the pigskin parade starts marching once again!

Braves Rap N. Y.; 15-10; Tigers Win

Near-Riot Climaxes Game Between Chisox, Browns; Bums Crack Out Twin Bill

Manager Bob Coleman loomed today as Boston's miracle man No. 2.

The rapid rise of the Braves to a contending position in the National league pennant race had baseball followers thinking back 30 years when the Braves under George Stallings, the original miracle man, climaxed a great stretch drive to win their first and only pennant, after being in last place in mid-season. Since that 1914 season, the Braves have been in the first division only five times, but today, after a 15-10 drubbing of the New York Giants last night for their 12th victory in the last 16 games, they were only two games away from second place and only one behind the fifth place Giants.

Holmes Paces Braves Paced by Tommy Holmes, the league's leading hitter and first baseman, Joe Mack, Boston outslugged the Giants in a game in which six pitchers gave up 32 hits, 16 for each side. Holmes, with three hits, increased his batting mark to .385 and extended his consecutive hitting streak to 17 straight games. Mack batted in six runs with a homer, double and single, and scored four times.

A pair of homers by Danny Gardella and one by Johnny Rucker failed to help the Giants, who dropped their 19th game in the last 24, and fell into the second division for the first time this season.

Those onrushing Brooklyn Dodgers cracked out a double win over the Philadelphia Phillies, 4-2 and 8-1, to pull three games in front of the second place Pittsburgh Pirates. Art Herring won his first game of the year in the opener, while Curt Davis registered his sixth triumph in the nightcap.

Detroit Blanks Indians Left Hal Newhouser, Detroit's 29-game winner last year, won his 10th this season, blanking the Cleveland Indians 5-0 for his third shutout. Newhouser helped rack up his fifth successive victory by batting in three runs with a double and single. The win increased the Tigers' American league lead to two and one-half games over the idle New York Yankees.

A four-run eighth inning climaxed the Chicago White Sox's second straight victory over the St. Louis Browns, 4-1, and dropped the American league champions to sixth place.

Near-Riot at Chicago The excitement began when Pitcher George Caster, infuriated at the riding he had taken from the Sox "jockeys," fired the ball into their dugout as he was called off the mound by manager Luke Sewell. After players from both teams had rushed onto the field, followed by spectators from the stands, the umpires, with the aid of police, finally restored order. No action was taken by the officials.

The Chicago Cubs moved into third place in the National league, four percentage points over the St. Louis Cardinals, by defeating the Pirates, 5-3. Claude Passeau held the Bucs scoreless, relieving Bob Chipman in the sixth. Phil Cavarretta's two-run homer provided the margin of victory.

Senators Whip A's Washington made it three in a row over the Athletics as Mickey Haefner outpitched Bobo Newsom 7-5. The victory moved the Senators into fifth place.

The Red Sox-Yankees scheduled twin bill was rained out, while Cincinnati and the Cardinals were not scheduled.

Jim Thorpe Joins Merchant Marine LOS ANGELES, June 21 (AP)—Jim Thorpe, the great Indian athlete of three decades ago, has joined the merchant marine, the only service that he could get into at the age of 57.

His wife disclosed that he joined up last month after the enlistment in the navy of his 18-year-old son, Phillip.

Greenberg Set To Go With Tigers

DETROIT, June 21 (AP)—Warning to American league pitchers: Hank Greenberg is back and rarin' to swing that big bat again.

The 34-year-old Detroit Tiger first baseman-outfielder, who was released from the army last week after four years' service, arrived here last night.

Greenberg was scheduled to report at Briggs stadium today for the beginning of intensive batting practice, which is expected to get him in shape to rejoin the Tiger lineup by June 30.

Greenberg, who was inducted into the army May 7, 1941, disclosed that he was placed on the army inactive list, not discharged.

"I'm just like Larry McPhail—on the inactive list and subject to recall if the air force wants me," the 215-pound slugger said.

College Net Stars Ready For Tournery

EVANSTON, Ill., June 21 (AP)—A field of 60 college tennis players from 25 schools—largest entry since the war—is ready to open the 61st annual national collegiate championship tournament on the Northwestern university courts next Monday.

Francisco (Pancho) Segura, of the University of Miami, Fla., is returning to defend the singles title he captured in 1943 and 1944 and he's bringing along a schoolmate, Tom Burke, who will be making his initial appearance in the tournament.

Should Segura succeed in winning his third straight singles title, he will be the first collegian to turn the trick since a boy by the name of M. G. Chace of Yale scored a trio of titles back in 1895.

From the Pacific coast entrants include Nick Buzolic of George Pepperdine college, Los Angeles, and Stanley Clark of California Tech, Pasadena, who were quarter-finalists in last year's tournery.

Boeringer Named Assistant Grid Coach At Iowa

IOWA CITY, Ia., June 21 (AP)—Arthur (Bud) Boeringer, Notre Dame's 1926 All-America center and for 18 years football line coach at Detroit university, has been named assistant to Head Coach Clem Crowe at the University of Iowa.

Boeringer went to Detroit after graduating from Notre Dame in 1927 and remained as assistant to Coach Gus Dorais until Detroit suspended football for the duration after the 1942 season. He and Crowe were teammates on the 1925 Irish eleven, captained by the Hawk-eyes' new grid coach.

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Acorns Sweep Double Bill From Los Angeles Angels; Take Over Third Place

The Portland Beavers and Seattle Rainiers, taking turnabout this week in the "win-loss" department, are separated again today at the top of the Pacific Coast league by four and a half games, while minor shuffling in the lower ranks put the Oakland Acorns and San Francisco Seals in possession of the other two first division berths.

Portland squared its series with the Sacramento Solons by winning 6-1 last night, as Seattle dropped a 5-1 contest to San Diego for a one-all standing against the Padres. The Acorns' 8-7 and 6-4 sweep of a twin bill with the Los Angeles Angels enabled them to hang onto third place half a game ahead of the Seals, who won twice from Hollywood's Stars 9-6 and 8-2.

Hurlers Take Spotlight Top pitching performances marked the northwest duels. The Beavers' veteran submariner, Ad Laska, held the Solons to six scattered hits and a single run, while his mates were pounding two Sacramento hurlers for 13 blows good for six tallies. Sacramento got its lone counter in the fourth stanza when Jo-Jo White singled, stole second and scored on a single by Eddie Zipay. Portland pushed over two in the fifth and another in the sixth off Gene Babbitt, and got three more in the eighth off Relief Pitcher Dick Powers.

San Diego's Vic Trahd duplicated Laska's feat in limiting Seattle to six hits and one run, scored in the sixth inning. The Padres found their former teammate, Chet Johnson, easy pickings as they shooed across three runs in the third and drove him to the showers with two more in the fourth.

Seals Move Up The Seals' double victory moved them up a notch, displacing Sacramento in the first division. Three Hollywood moundsmen were unable to stem the San Francisco assault in the seven-inning opener, giving up 12 hits good for nine runs. The O'Doulmen, trailing 4-0, blasted out four tallies in the third and repeated in the fourth to put the game on ice. Tony Buzolic, who replaced Elmer Orella, on the hill for the Seals in the fourth, got credit for the victory. The bay city team clinched the regulation finale in a big fourth inning, scoring six runs off Porter's Bob Williams on a combination of three hits, three walks and a hit batsman. Right-hander Frankie Seward went the route for San Francisco.

Acorns Win Twice Los Angeles fans saw their team outbit the Acorns but still lost both ends of a doubleheader. The Angels collected 13 safeties in the opener, one more than Oakland, but failed in the pinches. Each team used three pitchers, with Jack Lott getting credit for Oakland's 8-7 win. Both clubs rapped out 11 hits in the afterpiece, which went 11 innings before the Acorns pushed over two runs off "Pancho" Comellas to win 6-4.

Rip Russell of the Angels homered in each tilt to bring his season's total to nine. Jack Caulfield and Norm Deweese of Oakland ran their consecutive hitting streaks to 11 and 15 games, respectively.

Louis B. Mayer's Busher, Charles S. Howard's Sea Sovereign, and Henry Forrest's Mexican Star, Checkerhall, were

rated in the top bracket, with Jay Paley's Best Effort and War Allies of the Armstrong stables just a step lower in the prederby calculations.

J. Kel Houssell's Bymeabond took on new luster as a contender as it appeared likely his rider would be George (The Iceman) Woolf. Woolf is expected to end the decision when he arrives today.

There was only a slight chance he might ride Sea Sovereign or Bismarck Sea, the other Howard horse entered. Howard's trainer, Bud Stotler, said yesterday Ferrill Zufelt was the choice to ride the Sovereign.
