

YOUR GARDEN

The tomato is the number one vegetable of the home garden. Most growers in Klamath county find this vegetable rather difficult to grow because of the short growing season and the continual frost hazards. However, most everyone who raises a garden makes an effort to produce some tomatoes. This vegetable will produce on a wide range of soils and under varying conditions. There are pages and pages of instructions available on growing tomatoes. A few rather simple cultural directions are all that are necessary for the home gardener.

Tomato growers are in accord on one point: that is the soil must be well drained, fertile, and retain moisture during the growing season if irrigation water is not available. A well prepared and fertilized tomato soil is one filled with organic matter from barnyards, or compost heaps, or from cover crops. It is an accepted rule that organic matter is required, and to vary from this rule is to invite disappointment in tomato yields and crop quality.

To Stake or Not to Stake
There are plenty of arguments over whether tomato plants should be staked or allowed to sprawl over the ground. They are successfully grown both ways. Staking has its place when tomatoes are grown in borders in city and urban gardens, and where space is limited. Staked tomatoes may be set two feet apart. When tomatoes are not staked, four feet apart each way is a convenient spacing. Some use stakes

six feet tall and others use three and four foot stakes. The vines are tied to short stakes and allowed to hang over.

One advantage of staking is that the fruit is protected from sunburning by the shade from the overhanging foliage on very hot days. This seems important with some varieties since the fruit is often badly sunburned when tomatoes are sprawled on the ground. Sunburning of this nature has been quite a common occurrence in the higher altitudes of eastern Oregon where sparse foliated tomato varieties are selected, suitable to the short growing season. One authority recommends placing tomato stakes before the plants are set to avoid interference with the root system, as might be the case when the stakes are driven after the plants start growing. This authority points out that tomato plant roots spread or extend laterally each way sometimes 48 inches while occupying a depth of not over 10 inches deep. These facts should be remembered too, when tomato plants are cultivated.

A method of tying tomato plants to stakes is to fasten twine or narrow strips of cloth firmly to the stake, then tie a loop loosely about the plant. Strips of cotton cloth are often

CORVALLIS, June 21 (AP)—More government surplus trucks may be obtained for Oregon farmers under a new sales plan, N. C. Donaldson, executive assistant of the state AAA committee said today.

The new program provides for sales of allocated trucks to dealers who agree to resell to farmers and farmer cooperatives within designated areas. Farmers who hold AAA certificates can then purchase trucks direct.

The Oregon AAA committee has designated Oregon's wheat belt as one area and sent estimates of the needs there to Washington. Possibly six other areas in the state will be designated later, Donaldson said.
