

WAGE CEILING RATES LISTED FOR GROWERS

Weekly Market Trend

Editor's Note: The following market information is compiled from material obtained over the government leased wire in the office of the extension economist at Oregon State colleges. The material, in the form of a weekly summary of trends, is not intended to replace day by day market reports.

LIVESTOCK FEED CONDITIONS
Slightly larger total livestock feed requirements in the United States during the 1943-46 feeding season are indicated by the available estimates from the bureau of agricultural economics but current crop prospects remain fairly favorable with carry-over of old-crop feed grain probably will be considerably larger than last year.

Range and pasture conditions have been generally favorable so far this season, adding to the available feed supply. Feed production for harvest still depends considerably on growing conditions ahead, however, especially with corn.

In Oregon, condition of ranges improved during the early spring and reported to be around 18 per cent above a year ago and 5 per cent above average. Cattle and sheep conditions are reported to be better than last year, but slightly below the average.

CATTLE MARKETS
Retail receipts of cattle at North Portland on Monday, June 21, totaled 1500 head, 100 fewer than a week ago and around 500 fewer than a year ago. There were also 400 calves offered, the same number as a year ago. The market was uneven with good to choice yearling steers and best grass cows steady. The market for cull cows was about steady. The bulk of the good to choice steers brought \$17 to \$18—not much changed from last week but around \$1 above a year ago. Grass fat beef cows brought \$12 to \$12.50. Good to choice yearling heifers brought \$12.50 to \$13, with a few as high as \$16.50. A year ago they brought \$14.50 to \$15.50.

SHEEP AND LAMB MARKETS
Retail receipts of sheep and lambs at North Portland today amounted to 1750—about 250 less than a week ago and around 1000 less than a year ago. Good to choice spring lambs were steady compared with early last week but were about 50 cents above prices in the latter part of the week. Strictly sorted spring lambs today brought up to \$14.25. Other classes were slow with prices around 25 cents or more lower.

HOG MARKETS
Hog markets continued active with prices at ceiling.

Government Problems Set For Discussion
PORTLAND, Ore., June 21 (AP)—A 23-man board of inter-governmental relations will meet in San Francisco September 21 to begin work on governmental problems of the three west coast states.

The board—11 representatives of federal agencies and 12 local representatives—was set up here yesterday by a conference of Oregon, Washington, and California officials. Governor Earl Warren of Calif., here for the conference, will preside at the September meeting.

Maximum Wage Rates
1. General farm labor, \$1 per hour when no housing or other prerequisites furnished or \$200 per month plus housing.
2. Harvest labor:
A. Wage rates for picking potatoes, 5c per half sack of 60 pounds.
B. Wage rates for all other potato harvest, labor, \$1.25 per hour.
C. \$1.25 per hour for hay stackers.
D. \$1 per hour for all other harvesting labor.
E. Header tender, \$8 per day and board.
F. Jigger and cartman, \$9 per day and board.
G. Sack sewers, \$10 per day and board.
H. Truck drivers, \$10 per day and board.
I. Machine man (combine or separator) operator, \$12 per day and board.
J. Caterpillar drivers (single combine), \$9 per day and board.
K. Caterpillar drivers (two or more combines), \$10 per day and board.
L. Bucking sacks, \$10 per day and board.
M. In the event board is not furnished, the rates above set out may be increased \$1 per day.

Onion Harvest
A. Hand topping and sacking, 20c per sack of 100 pounds.
B. Wage rates for loading,

bucking and swamping, \$1.25 per hour.
C. All other harvest labor at the rate for general farm labor sub-section (6) (1) above.

Control Methods Used For Wild Mustard In Crops Here

Wild mustard control work in grain and onion acres, is about wound up for another year in Klamath Basin, growers state.

Spraying with sinox and dusting by plane has been used throughout the area to stop the advance of the weed in crop acres, but the season is too far advanced now for further effectiveness.

The spray mixture is usually prepared in the early spring and used to best effect commencing about May 25 through to June 15, when the mustard is at the four to seven leaf stage of growth. If used on warm humid days the method is about 100 per cent effective. Crops may be slightly scorched by the spray

and growth retarded from five to seven days.
The mixture is prepared with one gallon of sinox, ten pounds of ammonium sulphate and 100 gallons of water. Eighty gallons of mix will supply an acre. Sprayed from a 1200 gallon tank, mounted on caterpillar tracks, with a boom or pipe across the front of the tractor, supported with cables with spray nozzles, the mixture can spray a 50 foot strip at one time.

Acres close to or bordered by irrigation ditches are the most easily treated by the spray method. When the water has to be hauled a great distance, work becomes expensive, and is delayed.

Some crop dusting from air-

planes has showed good results, growers state, but quite often too it has proven inadequate, and most growers prefer the spray method. Dusting by air is much more convenient, and it is hoped to be used exclusively eventually. At the present time, however, it is still rather in the experimental stage of development.

If mustard is kept down each year by control methods it is eventually wiped out, farmers agree. The program is a long-
