Radish Crop Successful On Marine Farm Project

The half acre of radishes on the 15-acre marine farm has already yielded 2400 bunches of radishes.

The agricultural project, under the sponsorship of Klamath junior farmers, is a branch of the Marine Barracks educational service of which Capt. Harry C. Mahan is in charge.

Five acres were planted in potatoes after the rains were over. Three acres are devoted to sweet corn, one and a quarter acres in onions, half an acre in peas and half an acre in carrots.

Seventeen men are working the field now. They have classroom study in the mornings under Cpl. Dwight Moser, covering growing and marketing of crops, livestock and poultry.

Proper use of fertilizer, irrigation and seed bed preparation, and financial management are also included in the eight weeks course, with practical application on the farm in the afternoons.

Any profits from the project will be turned over to the post recreation department. The men working the acreage now represent eleven states, including Indiana, Texas, New Hampshire, Utah, Georgia, Mississippi, California, New York, Ohio, Wisconsin and Nevada.

All these men have worked on farms in their home states, but find the whole system different in this state, because of different conditions.

WAG INJURED IN GI-FRENCH SCUFFLE

PARIS, June 22 (AP)—Wag Pvt. Helen Potter of Detroit is recovering from injuries suffered in a scuffle between American and French soldiers on the Champs Elysees Monday, her physician announced today.

"We've had the usual soldier fights," he commented. "One night a French Foreign Legion boy was beaten up and, because of his threats to get revenge, we doubled the military police detail around the Montmartre district for one night. That was several days ago."

The provost marshal said reports of open clashes between French and American troops in Paris lacked authenticity and that only the usual number of military police were on duty now.

The Potter incident was reported to have developed when she sought to cross the avenue during a French parade which had blocked it off for an hour.

Buhrmaster said the girl and several American soldiers tried to break through the parade to get to their jobs on the other side when a French soldier, "carrying out his orders," interfered. The scuffle followed.

Red Sour Cherries To Be Set Aside

PORTLAND, Ore., June 22 (AP)—Processors have been ordered to set aside 100 per cent of all 1945 hot packed and frozen red sour cherries for the government, the war food administration said today.

Dean Anderson, WFA fruit and vegetable branch marketing representative, said the order, effective June 20, also limits commercial processing of the crop to hot packing and freezing. Below average prospects for this year's cherries caused the regulation, he reported.

Only 25 per cent of the cherries frozen last year may be frozen in 1945, and each frozen package must weigh at least 30 pounds, Anderson said.

Wrecked Trawler To Be Scrapped

VICTORIA, B. C., June 22 (CP)—The Otter trawler, P. Z. Caverhill, which had 20 feet of her stern sheared off by an American freighter off Sheringham Point, June 7, will be scrapped after her engine is removed, Harry Barnett, marine surveyor, announced today.

The 43-ton vessel, owned and operated by John Steffich of Vancouver, B. C., was valued at more than \$20,000.

Minister Predicts Albanian Freedom

PORTLAND, June 22 (AP)—A prediction that Albania will become an independent nation after the European peace settlement came from Dr. Hugh G. Grant, former American minister to the country.

Albania is only as large as Vermont, but her people are "intensely nationalistic," Grant declared.

SPRING PIG CROP BELOW U. S. GOAL

WASHINGTON, June 22 (AP)—The agriculture department reported today that the 1945 spring pig crop totaled about 51,687,000 head.

This was far short of the government's goal of 57,500,000 head.

The spring pig crop will move to market for slaughter next fall and winter.

A survey of farmers' plans indicate, the department said, a fall crop of about 35,300,000 head. The government goal for the fall crop is 37,000,000 head.

Thus if government estimates turn out to be correct, the 1945 production of hogs would total about 87,000,000 head compared with 86,753,000 in 1944 and with 121,706,000 in 1943.

CATHOLIC HERALD FLAYS RUSSIANS

LONDON, June 22 (AP)—The Catholic Herald, published weekly in London, declared today that Russian behavior in Europe was "no better" than "Hitlerian fascist threat and aggression."

Answering charges made by a weekly publication of the soviet embassy that "no matter what crimes the Hitlerites committed there was no reaction of anger or indignation at the Vatican," the Herald declared the Russians signed a pact with Hitler and "the soviet invaded Poland and shared the swag with Hitler."

The Herald said the Holy See used the same standard to judge all men and "it must use it in the case of bolshevism and those who bear responsibility for crimes committed in its name."

The publication added that attacks on the church and the pope are an old "Moscow custom" and that the present "standards" take their place with the "bitter persecution against Christianity which started in 1918 and the number of whose murdered victims cannot be counted."

Round-World Flight Planned By Airline

NEW YORK, June 22 (AP)—An 88-hour, round-the-world flight on Pan-American Airways commercial passenger planes from resumption of post-war travel, was announced yesterday by the firm's Atlantic division.

Cost of the trip was listed as \$700, or less than the present round-trip to Europe. The firm said reservations already had been made by 11 passengers.

The route from New York, the company said, will cover Lisbon, Marseille, Rome, Athens, Cairo, Basra and Karachi to Calcutta of the Atlantic division, and then return via Bangkok, Canton, Tokyo, Paramushiro, Anchorage, Seattle and San Francisco to New York.
